

## MOHMAND TRIBES VERY AGGRESSIVE

They Attempt Unsuccessfully to  
Cut British Commander's  
Lines of Communication.

### TROOPS SENT AGAINST THEM

Their Loss, Including Several Officers,  
Sixty-Two Men—Mutiny Will  
Be Promptly Suppressed.

Simla, April 24.—In consequence of an attempt made by the Mohmand tribesmen to cut his lines of communication, Sir James Willcox, the commander of the British forces sent out from Peshawar against the raiding natives, attacked the enemy this morning with two columns, comprising all his available troops.

After a sharp fight the British troops dislodged the tribesmen. The British casualties are given as 60. The Mohmand losses are unknown.

A later dispatch received here from Peshawar says:

"The Matia was attacked last night, but the enemy was repulsed. There was heavy artillery firing today at Shabakad, and Gen. Anderson's brigade fought a big engagement. Our casualties numbered 62, including several British officers."

Lord Minto, viceroy of India, and Lord Kitchener, commander-in-chief of the British forces in India, will arrive here tomorrow and the British will assume the offensive as quickly as possible.

Sir James Willcox has control of 10,000 troops, comprising three brigades, two of which are concentrating on the border, the third being held in reserve at Peshawar.

Desultory fighting is reported all along the line, 15 miles, from Michni on the Kabul river to Abazad on the Swat river. Maj. Gen. Willcox's center rests on Shabakad fort.

#### WILL SUPPRESS MUTINY.

London, April 24.—The government has been informed of the gravity of the Mohmand mutiny in India, and it is believed that it will be soon suppressed. Lord Kitchener has made a timely disposition of his forces. The worst aspect of the situation is seen in the apparent complicity of the ameer, which is regarded in some quarters as an outcome of the recently concluded Anglo-Russian compact, which leaves Afghanistan free as a buffer state from either British or Russian attacks.

The ameer's attitude is considered to be less due, however, to any real feeling against Great Britain than to his indifference to the assistance of the Afghans in rendering them with arms, ammunition, etc.

The frontier of this region has never been delimited. Part of the Mohmands country lies within the Afghan boundary and part in British India. This also may account for the assistance being rendered to the tribesmen by the Afghans.

#### WALLACE H. HOPKINS.

Indicted Mining Broker, Believed to Be in Chicago.

Chicago, April 25.—The Tribune today says:

Chicago is now among the cities in which Wallace H. Hopkins, the indicted mining broker, is reported to be sojourning. Inquiry last night of his attorney, Francis A. Harper, brought the declaration that Hopkins was not out of town at all, in spite of the other reports that he was anywhere from Canada to the Gulf coast. Hopkins was not available, but a man representing himself to be the broker, was willing to discuss affairs via telephone, the arrangement being made by the lawyer.

The man who said he was Hopkins declared that he would remain in town and, "if given time," would pay his creditors in full.

He had made up his mind when he asked to be excused from answering any of the questions whether or not he would give himself up to the authorities today. That was one of the things he would consider, he said.

Mr. Hopkins will have to give a \$10,000 bond, should he decide to leave cover, under an indictment returned by the grand jury, charging him with embezzlement and larceny. He also will have to assure the federal authorities that he will appear when wanted to answer the charge of using the mails with intent to defraud.

## WILLIAM HAYWOOD OUT

His Services as Representative of the  
Western Federation of Miners in  
The Field Are Terminated.

Denver, April 24.—Formal announcement was made in today's issue of the Miner's Magazine, official organ of the Western Federation of Miners, over the signature of C. E. Mahoney, first vice president and acting president of that organization, that the executive board has terminated the services of Wm. D. Haywood as a representative of the federation in the field. Last December, after Haywood's acquittal at Boise, Idaho, on the charge of complicity in the murder of former Gov. Steunenberg, he was superseded as secretary treasurer of the federation by Ernest Mills, on order of the executive board. Since that time he has been employed as a lecturer and organizer for the federation and has made a tour in the east. It is intimated that the executive board disapproved of his activity in advocacy of socialist theories.

## SUES FOR PART OF CHICAGO WATER FRONT

Chicago, April 24.—On a claim 72 years old, Samuel H. Bowman, a Minneapolis lumberman, filed suit in the United States circuit court yesterday to recover lake front land valued at millions of dollars and held by the city of Chicago, the South Park commission and the Illinois Central railroad.

The suit is based upon the fact that Bowman's ancestor, John Bowman, declared in his will that he had acquired through three-quarters of a century, but which recent investigation has cleared up to such an extent as to warrant legal action. The belated cause stems from the Illinois Central's suburban track reservation, a part of Michigan boulevard and sections of Grant park.

The land consists of two parcels, one of 11 and the other of 26 acres, and was purchased from the government May 31, 1836, at \$1.25 an acre, or a total of \$43.75. Now its value is almost incalculable.

The city of Chicago, the Illinois Central and the South Park commissioners are made defendants to the bill. The bill does not state why 72 years ago Bowman was permitted to roll by before court action was sought.

## RUNNING 60 MILES HOUR. TRAIN JUMPS TRACK

Hornell, N. Y., April 24.—Running at the rate of 60 miles an hour, Erie train No. 4, known as the Chicago express, jumped the track directly in front of the station at Canisteo, five miles from this city, this morning. A broken tire on the engine is believed to have caused the wreck. The engine and eight cars were derailed but remained right side up. The passengers were thrown about and many of them cut and bruised, but none of them seriously hurt.

The engineer and fireman, who stuck to their posts, escaped injury.

#### RUSSIAN WARSHIPS.

Report That Five Had Been Ordered From Clyde Firm, Untrue.

St. Petersburg, April 24.—The report published in England to the effect that the Russian government had ordered five warships from a firm of Clyde shipbuilders is untrue. The admiralty has adopted the principle that all warships should be constructed in Russia, and it is impossible that any vessels have been ordered either here or abroad for this year. As the Duma intends to reject the estimates on the new battleships, the program for 1909 will probably be very small.

#### KILLED BY TORNADO.

Memphis, Tenn., April 24.—A tornado swept over Walls, Miss., at 2 o'clock this morning and it is reported to have destroyed the town. Three persons are reported killed and several injured.

Telegraph and telephone wires are down between Memphis and Walls. This report of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley railroad depot was blown off and the building otherwise wrecked.

## BOYCOTTS HELD TO BE ILLEGAL

Nevada Supreme Court Renders  
A Decision Against Indus-  
trial Workers of World.

### REVERSED THE LOWER COURT

Not Lawful for Workmen to Combine  
To Injure Another Man's  
Business.

Carson, Nev., April 24.—The supreme court of Nevada handed down a decision today which renders boycotts in all forms illegal and also makes it possible for parties injured to recover damages against any individual or corporation who institutes a boycott. The case in question was that of L. C. Bronson of Goldfield vs the Industrial Workers of the World. The I. W. W. and the Goldfield miners' union declared a boycott against Bronson, who conducted a newspaper.

The lower court ruled that as the union was a voluntary unincorporated body it could not as a body be sued. The supreme court reversed this decision and decided "neither under the common law nor under the statutes modifying the common law doctrines is it lawful for workmen to combine to injure another's business by causing his employees to leave his service by intimidation, threats, molestation or coercion."

Bronson through his attorneys has attached \$5,000 of the union money held in Goldfield and Tonopah. He will also sue to recover damages to the full extent of his losses by reason of the union boycott.

#### HIGH MEAT PRICES.

Protest Against Them Takes Form of  
Greatly Diminished Purchases.

Chicago, April 25.—Public protest against the high prices prevailing for fresh meat, particularly beef and mutton, is taking a form little to the liking of the wholesale and retail dealers. Not in many years has the public generally objected so vigorously to the extravagant values they are called on to pay for meats. The result has been a curtailment of the consumption on a scale not deemed possible a few months ago.

Meat salesmen all over Chicago, as well as in other large cities, assert that their trade has fallen off 50 per cent in the last month. The same complaint of poor demand is heard from shippers of live cattle and dressed beef to New York and other western points.

The consuming public has evidently unwittingly taken the only course that will bring about lower prices, and, by the substitution of other foods for the higher priced meats, is causing the meat dealers much concern.

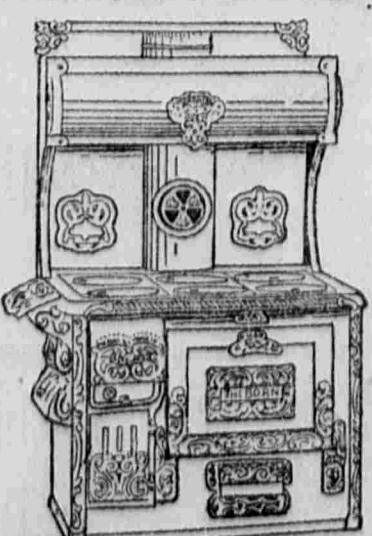
