They Attempt Unsuccessfully to Cut British Commander's Lines of Communication.

TROOPS SENT AGAINST THEM

Their Loss, Including Several Officers, Sixty-Two Men-Mutiny Will Be Promptly Suppressed.

Simla, April 24.-In consequence of an attempt made by the Mohmand tribes men to cut his lines of communication Sir James Willcox, the commander of the British forces sent out from Peshawaur against the raiding natives, attacked the enemy this morning with two columns, comprising all his available troops.

After a sharp fight the British troops dislodged the tribesmen. The British casualties are given as 60. The Moh-

mand losses are unknown. A later dispatch received here from

A later dispatch received here from Heshawaur says: "The Matta was attacked last night, but the enemy was repulsed, There was heavy artillery firing today at Shabaka-dar, and Gen. Anderson's brigade fought a big engagement. Our casual-ties numbered 62, including several

Sir James Willcox has control of 10,-Sir James Willcox has control of 10,-000 troops, comprising three brigades, two of which are concentrating on the border, the third being held in reserve at Pashawaur.

at Pashawaur. Desultory fighting is reported all along the line, 15 miles, from Michni on the Kabul river to Abazai on the Swat river. Maj. Gen. Willcox's center rests on Shabakadar fort.

WILL SUPPRESS MUTINY.

WILL SUPPRESS MUTIAT. London, April 24.—The government has been informed of the gravity of the Momand mutiny in India, and it is believed that it will be soon suppressed. Lord Kitchener has made a timely dis-position of his forces. The worst as-pect of the situation is seen in the ap-parent complicity of the ameer, which is regarded in some quarters as an out-come of the recently concluded Anglro-Russian compact, which leaves Afghan-istan free as a buffer state from either British or Russian agents. The ameer's attitude is considered to

The ameer's attitude is considered to be less due, however, to any real feel-ing against Great Britain than to his indifference to the assistance of the Afghans are rendering the fanatical tribes by supplying them with arms, ammunition, etc. The frontier of this region has never been deliminated. Part of the Moh-mands country lies within the Afghan boundary and part in British India. This also may account for the assist-ance being rendered to the tribesmen by the Afghans.

REVERSED THE LOWER COURT

Not Lawful for Workmen to Combine To Injure Another Man's Business.

Carson, Nev., April 24 .- The supreme court of Nevada handed down a decision today which renders boycotts in all forms illegal and also makes it possible for parties injured to recover damages against any individual or corporation who institutes a boycott. The case in question was that of L. C. Bronson of Goldfield vs the Industrial Workers of the World, The I. W. W. and the Goldfield miners' union de-

and the Goldfield miners' union de-clared a boycott against Bronson, who conducted a newspaper. The lower court ruled that as the union was a voluntary unincorporated body it could not as a body be used. RUSSIAN WARSHIPS.

Report That Five Had Been Ordered From Clyde Firm, Untrue.

From Cryde Firm, Unifue, St. Petersbury, April 24.—The report published in England to the effect that the Russian government had or-dered five warships from a firm of Clyde shipbuilders is untrue. The ad-mirality has adopted the principle that all battleships should be constructed in Russia, and it is impossible that any vessels have been ordered either here or abroad for this year. As the Duma intends to reject the estimates on the new battleships, the program for 1999 will probably be very small.
