JOHN HAFEN EXHIBITS PAINTING IN CHICAGO

Letter from One Well Known Utah Artist to Another Tells of Interest in This State.

J. B. Fairbanks, the artist, has received a letter from John Hafen in which he says that his exhibition of paintings in Minneapolis was opened May 17. He is showing 30 pictures at May 17. He is showing 30 pictures at the Board art galleries at Dayton's, a list of which is given herewith. Mr. Hafen says that the action of Utah in establishing an art institute has attracted the attention of artists in that city, one of whom, Mr. Koeler, is president of the State Art association. He expressed a desire to know all about the Utah Art institute and Mr. Hafen spent a whole afternoon with him talking over the plans of the artists of Utah to bring art to the front in this Utah to bring art to the front in this

Mr. Hafen is very enthusiastic about the state art museum for which the legislature has appropriated \$1,000 per year, and for which the artists of the state already have promised \$2,000 worth of pictures. Mr. Hafen says: "If Utah will help on the art museum her reputation will be enhanced thereby more than the value of \$10,000. Even the \$20,000 that is being put into the Seattle fair will not begin to give Utah the reputation that this \$10,000 would if spent on an art museum. Whatever reputation Utah gets through her art movements commands more respect Mr. Hafen is very enthusiastic about movements commands more respect than anything else."

Mr. Hafen speaks in very complimentary terms of the art feeling exhibited by the people in Minneapolis notably in so soon following the exam-

hibited by the people in Minneapoils notably in so soon following the example of Utah by establishing a similar organization to the Utah Art Institute.
