

**REAPING MACHINES.**—We have been informed by a manufacturer of agricultural implements, one who is excellent authority, that between fifteen and sixteen thousand reaping machines will be manufactured and sold this year in our country. The demand is so great that manufacturers cannot make them fast enough for their orders. This affords evidence of agricultural prosperity, as the cost of these machines will amount to nearly two millions of dollars. Our farmers exhibit wisdom in using and patronizing machinery. A reaping machine will save the price of itself in one season.—[Scientific American.]

The grounds belonging to the U. S. Arsenal at Baton Rouge, La., embrace an area of 27 acres. The buildings thereon are very extensive. In the three magazines there are 30,000 pounds of powder, and 9,000,000 rounds of cartridges for small arms and cannon. The storehouses contain 35,000 muskets, rifles, carbines and pistols, 2,500 sabres, 100 cannons, 600,000 cannon balls and shells, 30,000 pounds canister, and accoutrements for 10,000 men. The total value of the land and buildings with their contents is over \$1,000,000. An artillery store-room, two hundred feet long by fifty feet wide, and two stories high, has just been erected at a cost of \$35,000.

**FAMINE IN MADAWASKA.**—M. R. Kefp, a home missionary in Madawaska, writes to the Portland Mirror, under date of June 24, that the people in that portion of Maine are, and have been for some months in a state of starvation. He states that probably 500 families, with an average of eight children each, have gone without bread from one to eight weeks at a time this Spring. They keep alive now on greens, a few fish and frogs, and it is said they have eaten snakes. Several persons have died from starvation.
