Jepanese tea as exported, which ten years ago rose to such favor, especially in this country, is falling very low. It was at first choice in quality, and the quantity produced was relatively small; but the great demand for it induced the growers to abandon their ancient custom of picking only the young spring leaves. They soon took to stripping the plants all through the season and even to adding wisteria leaves.
