

## JEFFRIES AFTER STRONG MAN'S TITLE

Not Qualified by Raising Great Weights or Breaking Chains.

### BUT BY MIGHTY WALLOPS

The Wonderful Physique of the Champion of Heavyweights Make Him a Veritable Hercules.

New York, Oct. 28.—Strongest man in the world!

That is Jeffries' new title. The big brawler reveals in it. He much prefers the role of the twentieth century Hercules to the more pichian "champion heavyweight pugilist."

And who is there to dispute with this colossal fellow from the orange groves of California the high honor that he craves? Jeffries has qualified for his new title, not by raising huge weights on his chest and breaking great chains on his arms, but by delivering mighty wallops that have made him as feared in the arena of fustians as his mythological prototype of the Homeric era.

And what a Hercules in real life, bigger and brawlier than any of his fellows, this bearlike Californian would make, traveling about the country with a lion skin on his shoulders and a huge club in his right hand, if the conventionalities of modern society and police regulations did not inhibit such exhibitions.

Scattering a few grains of salt on these tales of ancient strength men it is pretty safe to say that many of the celebrated club wielders of antiquity fell far short of Jeffries' claims on the title.

If these stories of his past were not altogether too exaggerated, and some of these celebrated fellows had the punch that brings with it a trip to dreamland, it is a pity that one or two of them could not come back and give this conqueror of champions a season in the ring.

If anyone doubts the claims of Jeffries to the strong man title let him study the marvelous development of the giant's frame.

What a breadth of shoulders! What a mountain of muscles, yet clothed in lines of grace that tell of agility. The secret of this man's terrific blows that have made men quake in the ring upon contemplating his massive front is revealed at a glance. The shoulders, the arms and back tell the tale of resistless might.

When Jeffries was in the American office and posed for the remarkable pictures he consented to a remeasurement that shows him to be bigger than on the occasion of his last visit to Chicago.

Here are the figures: Weight, 255 pounds; height, 5 feet 11 inches; neck, 18 1/2 inches; chest (normal), 44 inches; expanded, 54 1/2 inches; reach, 78 1/2 inches; biceps, 16 inches; calf, 17 1/2 inches; forearm, 12 inches; high, 28 inches.

Jeffries, unlike many of his predecessors, is willing to fight on short notice.

Though thoroughly disgusted with the tactics of Jack Munroe, who got a little fame because of surviving four tame rounds with him, Jeffries would give the miner a chance if he really showed an honest desire to get into the ring with him.

### SAYS FITZ WILL WIN.

Jeffries Believes Red Robert Will Whip George Gardner.

New York, Oct. 28.—James J. Jeffries, champion heavyweight pugilist of the world, arrived this morning from Chicago. He looked in good condition and seemed able to defend his title at any moment. Contrary to reports received from Chicago, Jeffries says that he will not give Jack Munroe a chance to fight. "I am through with that fellow," said the champion. "He had his chance to meet me on the coast, but backed out of it. Now I will pay no more attention to him. The only way he can fight with me is to defeat some good men. Why, I be-

lieve the first man he meets will put him out. I will pay no attention to him."

In reference to the Fitzsimmons-Gardner fight Jeffries picks Fitzsimmons to win easily.

"All those stories that Fitzsimmons and myself are at odds are ridiculous," said Jeffries. "The reason I did not see him in Chicago was because I did not know he was in town."

### WOULD TRY JEFF.

Italian Fighter Joe Grim Says Champion Can't Knock Him Out.

New York, Oct. 28.—Joe Grim, the Italian champion, known as the rubber man on account of his ability to take punishment, would like to have Jim Jeffries try to put him out.

Grim has no more fear of the champion's pile driving right than he has of Joe Gans' jabs, and he says he is sure Jeffries cannot put him out in a limited number of rounds.

Grim has stayed the limit with such fighters as Jack O'Brien, Bob Fitzsimmons and Joe Gans. While each of these fighters has walloped Grim hard and often, the Italian has always succeeded in lasting to the final bell. His ability to stay six rounds before Fitz has set the sports guessing, and a question asked now is what would Jeffries do to him in a limited round bout?

### BOUT CALLED OFF.

Club Says There is Opposition to Young Corbett-Jordan Match.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 28.—Morris Levy, the manager of the Hayes Valley club, has been listening to advice of friends, and as a result has sent a telegram to Benny Jordan in New York, notifying the English champion featherweight that such opposition has arisen in this city to his meeting Young Corbett that he had been compelled to call the bout off. At the same time Levy apprised the champion featherweight of his action and notified him that he could fight Hanlon in this city in December if he wished. It is hard to get at the real object of the sudden switch in the program. For the past year the local sports have been educated up to the idea that Jordan is a great man and capable of putting up a splendid fight. Levy has made up his mind that the public wants to see Corbett and Hanlon come together again, and this is the match that will be substituted.

### EVENTS AT NEW YORK.

Most Complicated Affair Arose After Running of Last Race.

New York, Oct. 28.—The most complicated affair in the history of an eastern race track occurred after the running of the last race at Aqueduct today. ## LOU DILLON TROTS ANOTHER RECORD.

Mr. Billings Drives His Champion Trotter to Wagon in 2:00 Flat.

### TRIAL WAS SPECTACULAR.

The Monk and Equity, Lowered the World's Trotting Record For a Mile to Pole in 2:08.

Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 28.—The eight-day meeting of the Memphis Trotting association was brought to a fitting close this afternoon with the racing of two additional world's trotting records. Lou Dillon, Mr. Billings' champion trotter, driven by her owner, went a mile to pole in two minutes flat, cutting a second and three-quarters from the previous record, made by herself, and The Monk and Equity, driven by Mr. Billings, their owner, lowered the world's trotting record of 2:04 1/4 for a mile to pole to 2:08.

The performance of Lou Dillon in the mile trial to wagon was even more spectacular than the trial against time last Saturday, when she trotted a mile in 1:58 1/4.

The trial today was made with the customary two runners to set the pace and the forward motion. As the wide dust screen. As the horses drew near the last eighth pole the speed of the little mare was so terrific that Mr. Billings drew her from behind the forward sulky, driven by Doc Tanner, and the finish was made in a drive with two runners also. The trotter, all three horses flushing under the wire noses apart.

The start was made on the first trial and the quarter was reached in 25 1/2 seconds, the half in 50 1/4, three-quarters in 1:20 1/4, and the mile in 2:08 1/4. A great demonstration.

The Monk and Equity, driven by Mr. Billings, went a mile in easy fashion to pole in 2:08, with a single runner, driven by Doc Tanner to set the pace. The hand-some team was driven around the track at a slow jog, with the runner trailing behind, and just before the wire was reached the runner drew alongside and under the wire the three horses went for the trial against time. At the quarter the time was caught in 25 1/2, the half in 50 1/4, three-quarters in 1:20 1/4, and the mile in 2:08. Summary:

CHANCE FOR 'VARSITY. Indian Football Team Coming West for California Game.

Carlsbad, Pa., Oct. 28.—Coach Warner of the Carlsbad Indian football team is planning a trip through the west for his team. The team will play at Pasadena, Cal., on New Year's day.

If the Indians could be induced to stop off in Salt Lake long enough for a game, it would be a good chance for the 'Varsity team to play them, and if the game was well advertised it would draw like a mustard plaster. Every year there is a great deal of talk about securing a game with some eastern eleven, but the opportunities are always passing. The Indians are some team take advantage of this chance?

Ralph D. Kain in the Illustrated Sportsman News has written a long and interesting article about the Carlsbad Indian team.

"As a matter of fact, these hard-working and well-behaved wards of the nation have been from the start models of disciplined and educated conduct on the football field as well as off, and only their shoddy black hair and their swarthy faces mark them as unusual or odd when they line up against the 'pale-faces'."

"These lads are intensely fond of football, and they have left in them an inherited indifference to hurts, and a toughness of fibre that is their strongest quality when added to swiftness and agility of movement. They have seen them play through a hard game, without one call for 'time out' because of injury, and nearly everyone who has seen them play must have noticed the fierceness of their tackling, and their fashion of breaking out of a scrimmage on the rebound like so many rubber balls. In running, tackling and aggressive line-breaking, the Indians are unsurpassed."

"Their weakness is an argument in favor of the claim that football is a question of the trained mind as much as the powerful body. It is mental alertness and adaptability that the Carlsbad players find themselves lacking when they meet the first class teams. To analyze and meet the unexpected, and to solve the problems of a scientific attack and defense of a style to which they are not accustomed puzzles the slower and less effectively trained mind of the Indian, and he cannot make as quick a change of mental base as the white youth. This is to be expected, and the astonishing feature of it is that the Indian player is able to make the change in a flash. He comes to Carlsbad from the reservation a little savage, and in perhaps a half dozen years he is fashioned into the clean, alert, self-respecting young man who delights those who know good football, played with ardor, yet with self-control, and in-

teelligence of a high order. While his opponents shout and rave in moments of great stress, he plays the game in silence, without show of emotion, whether he wins or loses—the type of the true sportsman. He is a student, both of the wholesome training of football in the development of young manhood and of the magnificent work accomplished by the policy and life work of Colonel Pratt at Carlsbad."

### WARNER TO QUIT ALSO.

Glant Catcher Says John T. Brush Did Not Act Right.

Jack Warner is another one of John T. Brush's star ball tossers who says he will not play with the New York baseball team next season. The star backstop of the team who played such great ball during the season just ended says his reason for wanting to quit the Giants is the same as that announced by Joe McGinnity—shabby treatment from John T. Brush and the breaking of numerous promises.

Warner claims that he and McGinnity are not the only players who will quit the team next season, but that at least three others will also ask for their release.

"I will not play another season with the New York team unless they give me the money I ask. If McGinnity goes to the coast and takes charge of the team there I will go with him. The treatment which I received from President Brush was nothing short of disgraceful."

"Ted Hanlon, so I am told, would like to get me to play on his team next season. Hanlon is a good manager, and I would like to play for him. He knows how to treat a player. If Hanlon can secure my release and will pay me the money I want, I will ask McGinnity to call off our deal and play with Hanlon."

"Talking about our treatment by President Brush, Joe McGinnity did not exaggerate it in his statement in the Evening World."

The middle finger of my right hand was broken, and besides I had a sore ankle, which I received by being hit with a pitched ball. In no course of my injuries I went in and played the game, thinking that by helping to win games I, as well as all the other players, would be rewarded by President Brush by a cash bonus at the end of the season."
