Key's Politics—Counting In.

CHICAGO, 4.—The Inter-Ocean's
Washington special says: It is
reported from Chicago that the
Republican General Key voted the
Republican ticket at the recent elec-
tion. The fact is, Key has been
little less than a republican since
the war closed, and his voting the
straight republican ticket occasions
no surprise.

It is learned here, through private
sources, that extraordinary efforts
are being made in the 8th Alabama
district to count in Gen. Wheeler,
a straight democrat. The democrats
are stimulated in this game by the
knowledge that the House will be
very close and one vote will change
the result. It is also known that
Lowe will act with the republicans
in organizing the House, hence the
attempts to get the better of his
doing it. The way they are
doing it is this: When the fran-
chise was first conferred on the
blacks, the republican tickets were
printed with a picture of the eagle
on the flag on top, in order that the
ignorant blacks might know their
tickets. To prevent this, the demo-
cratic legislature passed a law, say-
ing the tickets should have no figure
or device upon them, meaning the
eagle, such as eagles or flags. In
two counties of Lowe's district,
where he got the heaviest majority,
the tickets were printed, Eighth
Alabama District. Instead of the
Roman numerals, the law abid-
ing democrats in the quarter con-
structed the figure 8 to be a violation of
the law which was passed, aiming at
the eagles and flags. Nothing could be
so ridiculous, yet upon this flimsy
pretext it is proposed to deny the
election certificate and give it to
Wheeler, so that he will participate
in the organization of the House.
Ex-Senator Dorsey is said to be
the Confederate army, being the young-
est man who attained that rank in
either army during the war.

Kept his Word—Virginia's Choice.

The Inter-Ocean's Washington
special says: Wade Hampton ap-
pears to have kept the pledge he made at
the Chicago Convention, that if
South Carolina should give Han-
cock an overwhelming majority. In
the face of an undoubted majority of
over 1,000 colored voters, and the
fact of the evidence of loyalty to
the Confederacy in democratic papers that
the negroes very generally turned
out at the polls, the democratic
managers have returned a majority
for Hancock in the 1st district.
With a single exception, Beau-
fort, where the blacks outnumber
the whites about 12 to 1, and the offi-
cial count promises to give the dem-
ocratic electors over 40,000 majority.
It was intended to return all five
democratic candidates for Congress
as elected, and the probability is
that all of them will get their cer-
tificates sooner or later, though even
after all the frauds perpetrated by
the democratic managers at the
various polling places in the Char-
leston district, there seems no doubt
but that Mackey, republican, will
carry the district by a majority ac-
cording to the first count.

Later returns from Virginia show
that the contest between the repub-
lican and regular democratic elector-
al tickets is very close, and some
hope is entertained that the Can-
may come in ahead, when the whole
State has been heard from. A gen-
tleman here received the following
dispatch this afternoon from Vir-
ginia: "Burke, United States District
Attorney for Virginia: Virginia is
in doubt. Half of the State only
gives the democrats 4,000 majority.
Strong republican counties to the
west. The democrats are inclined to
concede the State.

Feeling Towards the South.

The Times editorially comments
on the southern papers, particularly
on the Charleston News and Courier.
The great mass of the northern press
are free from vindictive feelings
towards the south. They are op-
posed to southern supremacy because
such speeches as Wade Hampton's
at Staunton, and Blackburn's on
"wiping out" post-bellum legisla-
tion, are evidence that the south
are the results of the war were secure,
and because the expressions of many
southern papers and orators to-
gether with some very suspicious
election returns satisfied them that
full votes, free ballots and fair counts
were not always to be had in the
south. If northern republicans
cherish a feeling of hate to the south
the southern people but for what
they believe, rightly or wrongly, to
be the feeling, conduct and aims of
southern politicians in regard to the
results of the war. With southern
people come to look on the north
and the republican party as this
Charleston paper does, and when
their political leaders talk less about
capturing the White House, and
more about the welfare of the south,
desire, in the interest of their con-
stituents, they will find party lines
breaking down, and northern and
southern men uniting in support of
measures that they are interested in.

Tammany Address.

NEW YORK, 5.—At a meeting of
the Tammany Hall general com-
mittee to-night, an address to the
democracy of the country was read,
claiming that Hancock's defeat was
due to fraud, intimidation and the
use of enormous sums of money by
the Republicans. The address con-
cludes as follows: The rage and
frenzy of the hour will pass away
and the sober judgment of the
American people will assert itself.
Then the democratic party with
clean hands on which, and on which
alone, will be borne the ark of
our political covenant, can present
itself once more for the suffrages of
the people.

Through defeat we will yet attain
to an sacred victory. One of the
wisest men that ever lived said
that none can aspire to set greatly
but those who suffer greatly.

Van Wyck moved an amendment,

F. Brady, Col. Rogers and others
opposed the amendment and said the

Some hot discussion was followed
by the rejection of the amendment
and the adoption of a resolution en-
dorsing the leadership of Kelly.

Superintendent Walling says: The
35 ballot boxes at police headquar-
ters, in relation to which so much
mystery prevails, were taken to the
quarters in order to verify the
count. The rumor that a number of
votes had been cashed for Wm. S.
Dowd, republican candidate for
mayor, instead of Wm. J. Kelly,
had been thrown out as defective.
Had the law recognized, in such
cases, the intent of the voters, the
ballots would undoubtedly be counted
for the republican candidate. A
reporter, who was present, said that
some voters thrown out in the can-
vass were returned on election day, but
was prevented by Chief O'Brien, of
the Election Bureau.

Tom Brown's Welcome.

Over three thousand people assem-
bled at the Cooper Institute to-night
at the public reception given in hon-
or of Thomas Hughes, Gen. Wm.
Curtis presided and delivered the
address of welcome. He was follow-
ed by Mr. Hughes, who read a paper
on co-operation.

Washington Items.

WASHINGTON, 5.—Secretary Sher-
man says: For the past two months
the purchase of silver of 1880, has
been preferred by the department,
but the price demanded by holders
has run up to the full amount of the
bonds, including interest when due.
The Secretary has instructed the
Assistant Treasurer at New York
to receive offers of sizes of 1880 on
each Wednesday as heretofore, offers
to be strictly confined to bonds of
that issue, and has authorized him
to purchase during the present week
these bonds to an amount not ex-
ceeding \$1,500,000 at \$10.275.

The belief among republicans is
that President-elect Garfield will
call the House in extra session on
the 5th of March next for reorganiza-
tion, and the Senate, as is always
the custom, to confirm his cabinet
and such other nominations as he
may have to make.

If Congressman Frye, of Maine, is
not elected to succeed Senator Ham-
lin, his chances for the Speakership
of the House will be excellent. Frye
is a warm personal friend of the
President-elect, and has goodly fol-
lowing in the House. It is urged in
Frye's favor as against Kasson, of
Iowa, that the long continuity of
Frye in Congress and his excellent
public services entitles him to pre-
side over the republican House.

Edward McPherson, late clerk of
the House, if it is said, would be again
willing to accept that trust. He
would probably meet with little or
no opposition. The veteran parla-
mentarian, John M. Barclay, in all
probabilities, resume his old posi-
tion of Journal clerk of the House.
Ex-Senator Dorsey is said to be
likely to succeed Col. Burch as Sec-
retary of the Senate.

There are many rumors that Ma-
honey, of Virginia, will set with the
republicans and thus tie the Senate,
in case California returns another
republican, in consideration of hav-
ing at his disposal the Federal pa-
tronage of Virginia.

Sector Senor is spoken of in con-
nection with the Austrian mission
under Garfield.

Senator Blaine will arrive in
Washington next Monday to remain
until the holiday recess of Congress.
