A tin tube wis extended a distance of thirty feet from the generator. An ordinary gas burner was placed at the other end of the tube and a strong and luminous flame was obtained, the light being equally as brilliant as when the burner was attached directly to the generator. It is believed by the enthusiastic memmers of the company that this gas will supplant electricity in the lighting of streets in the cities. Another test will be made tonight when an ordinary gas will be used. Judge Colborn will go east in a few

days to arrange for the manufacture of the machines on an elaborate scale. The light seems to be a perfect success and those interested in the enterprise have high hopes for it.
