BOND ISSUE SOLD TO CHICAGO FIRM

Woodin, McNear & Moore of Windy City Bid Low and Get Bonds.

WHEELING IS SUSPENDED.

Detective Who Struck a Visitor to Chief's Office Is Pegged Back Ten Miles—Fitzgerald Confirmed.

Woodin, McNear & Moore of Chicago, the firm offering to take the \$600,000 bond issue of Salt Lake at 4 1/2 per cent, was awarded the contract by the city council last night. Only two bids of the six received were given consideration, the other being that of Devitt, Trimble & Co., of Chicago, offering to take the bonds at par at 4 1/2 per cent and give a bonus of \$9,525.

Considerable discussion was indulged in over the two bids, Councilmen Hall and Stewart contending that the tender of the Devitt people was the better for the city. The difference between the bids was finally determined to be that Woodin, McNear & Moore offered an advantage of 1/2 per cent, or between 4 1/2 per cent and 4 3/4 per cent interest.

Hall and Stewart stood out until the last, and voted against the awarding of the bonds to the successful firm. The council will hold a special session Thursday evening for the purpose of passing an ordinance confirming the sale.

FITZGERALD CONFIRMED. W. L. Fitzgerald was confirmed as assistant chief of the fire department. The nomination had been made the week before, but was held up pending investigation by the fire committee. Last night the committee recommended the appointment be confirmed, which was done. Mr. Fitzgerald has been captain at station 5 up to the time of his promotion to be assistant to Chief Fiero.

WHEELING IS SUSPENDED.

The matter of the assault made by Detective Frank Wheeling on the person of the chief of police, which occurred in the office of the chief of police, came up for consideration, Councilman Peterson said the offending officer should be suspended for 30 days for conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman, but the police committee did not wish to make the case a precedent for the "inner circle" favorite so pronounced, and recommended that he be let off with ten days' suspension from service. The vote on Peterson's motion resulted in its defeat by a majority of 12 to 8.

The committee's report was then adopted, suspending Wheeling for ten days. A request for a license to sell liquor at 25 west First South street was received from J. E. Evans. Action on the matter was postponed for one week. This is the place against which Dinwoody and others petitioned against, which petition was turned down at Monday evening's meeting.

The request of the Salt Lake Atkins for a refund of \$80 paid to the city by him when clerk in the poll tax office, for a bad check handed him by some wily Japanese for poll taxes, returned by the finance committee for further consideration. Some of the committee were in favor of denying the request but the matter will be taken up again.

Councilman O'Donnell succeeded in getting through the council a resolution ordering the commencement of work immediately on the extension 125. The extension is on the west side, in the second precinct, from which Mr. O'Donnell hails.

PITT'S BILLS ARE PAID.

The bills from Chief Tom Pitt, calling for \$170 for "secret service" and \$30 for "hack hire," which had been turned down by the finance committee, were paid back to the finance committee for further consideration. Some of the committee were in favor of denying the request but the matter will be taken up again.

The request of property owners that the city should be paved with asphalt was granted and work ordered begun at once. E. F. Jones, named as patrolman by Chief Tom Pitt, to succeed C. A. Carlson, resigned, was confirmed. The new appointee is a son of Matthew Rhodes, for years connected with the force as a detective.

In accepting the resignation of Mr. Carlson, Mr. Stewart, chairman of the police and prison committee, said he regretted the resignation of Mr. Carlson, whom he regarded as a most capable officer.

The resolution by Fernstrom providing that Salt Lake residents should request annexation to the city was voted down. The matter will come up again when a petition for annexation is made.

The payroll for the half month ending Aug. 31, amounting to \$25,758, was approved.
