The board of directors of the Salt Lake public library has issued invitations to friends and patrons of the institution to attend the ceremony of opening and opening the new Packard building on State street, south of the Alta club, Friday evening next. MANY PAPERS FILED.
Numbered Documents in County Recorder's Office Reach 200,000.

Since the system of numbering the documents filed for record in the county recorder's office was instituted on June 1, 1888, there have been 200,000 documents filed. The instruments have required 208 books for recording and each book is composed of 600 pages. The year from Oct. 24, 1904, to Oct. 24, 1905, was a record breaker, according to the statement of County Recorder Perkins. In that period there were 15,000 documents filed for record in his office.

COTTAGE CONDEMNED.
New Building at State Mental Hospital Undergoing Repair.

The new cottage No. 4 at the State Mental hospital, which was completed about a year ago at a cost of \$35,000, has been condemned as unsafe and the 15 women patients have been removed to other quarters, while the roof is being taken off and the walls strengthened so as to be safe. Several weeks ago Supt. Calder noticed that the walls of the cottage were cracking and the matter was brought to the attention of Gov. Cutler and other members of the state board of insanity. An investigation was at once started and several building contractors were called in to inspect the building and all pronounced it unsafe. Last week Gov. Cutler asked City Building Inspector Lewis of this city to go with him to inspect the building. He did so and after a thorough inspection, agreed with the other contractors that

the building was unsafe. He also informed the governor that if the building was within his jurisdiction in this city he would order the roof off in 24 hours. The second bounty certificate issued in this county since the new law went into effect after the close of the last Legislature, was issued yesterday by Deputy County Clerk David A. Smith to James Myers of Murray, for the hide of a wild cat which he killed near Murray about a week ago. The first certificate under the new law was issued on Aug. 14 to George L. Davis for a coyote hide. The rate at which bounty certificates are being issued under the new law is in striking contrast with that of about a year ago, when the gang of bounty frauds men commenced working in this county.

HORSES CREMATED.

Three Animals Perish in Fire on Canebrake from Sack at Murray.

Three horses belonging to James Canebrake of Murray, perished in a fire on their owner's premises last night. About 11 o'clock flames were seen to issue from Mr. Canebrake's barn and before help could be secured the barn horses, a survey, eight bays and four sets of harness, were entirely consumed. 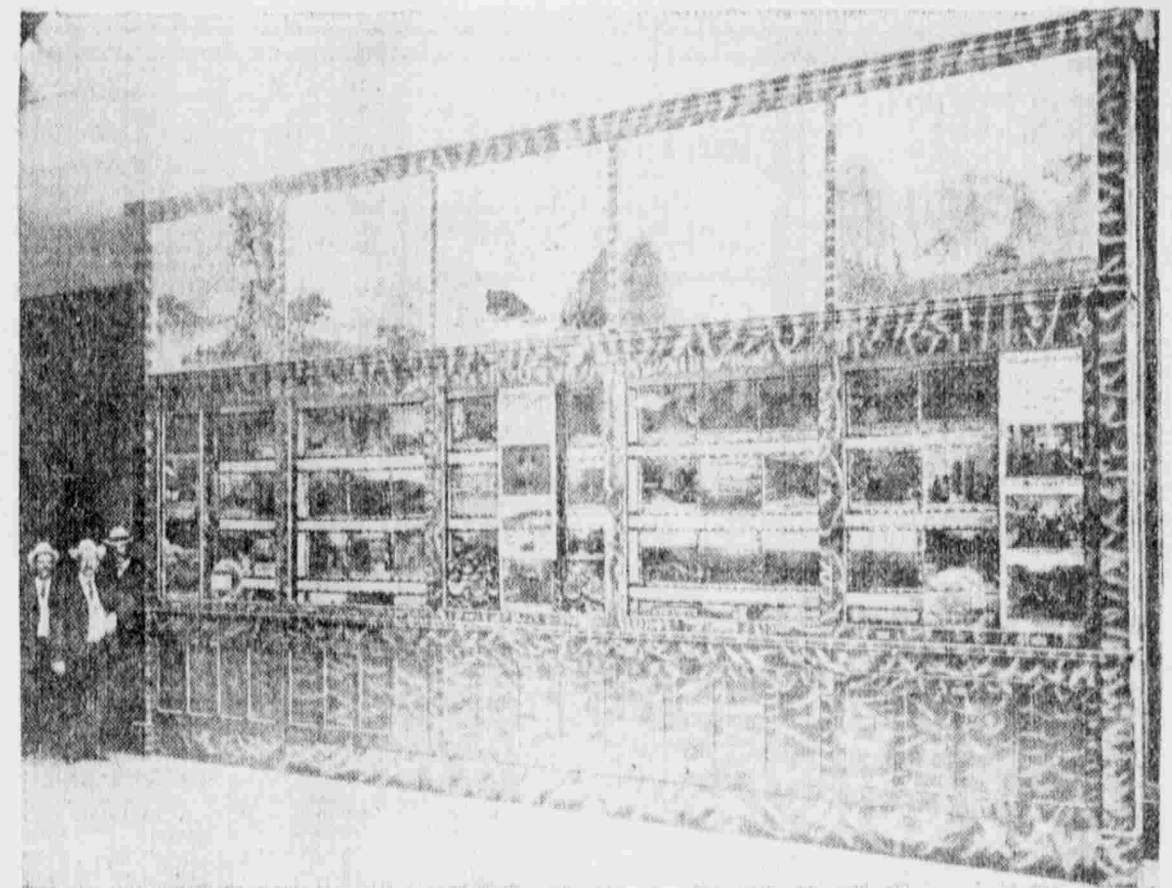

PANORAMA OF UTAH SHOWN ON SECOND SOUTH.



Scenic Panorama Machine in Operation.

Wonderful Electrical Display of Views, More Than Fifty in Number—A Fine Advertisement for the City and State.

On Second South street each afternoon and evening the Scenic Display Company is now exhibiting in panoramic form views of Utah and Salt Lake selected by the Commercial club to advertise the city and state. The display is a most attractive one, and there is no doubt that it will do a vast amount of good to the community, as after being exhibited here one month, it will be taken to the principal cities of the country, where it will be placed on exhibition 29 days in each place. The panorama is a new invention and belongs to the Scenic Display Company, incorporated under the laws of California.

The Salt Lake machine occupies three hundred and seventy-five square feet of wall space and has all the latest improvements. The device is in the form of a beautiful cabinet in oxidized copper effect, extending from the ceiling to the floor for a length of twenty-five feet. Back of the immense glass front is a splendid moving display of large colored transparent pictures, lighted from the back by scores of electric lights. The president of the company states that they have passed the experimental stage and consider the machine perfect and that it will serve as a model for the construction of all other machines.

This display is in operation daily from 1 o'clock to 11 p. m. and is receiving the praise and admiration of the multitudes.

The invention is the result of twenty years of experiment and study by J. W. Pawkes, Jr., of San Francisco, the patentee, who has traveled extensively both in Europe and this country, devoting his entire time to the subject. With the idea to make effective illustrative advertising three primary principles were involved: namely, light, color and movement. It is well known that not only the human eye but all the animal and insect world is attracted by light. Color is the poetry of the eye and brings out nature in all her gorgeous beauty and attractive loveliness.

Movement denotes life; life is the complement to light and color and united with them completes the idea of creation; this display introduces these three elements and affords the most perfect illustrative advertising. To make this effective and valuable to the

world at large the company is working on the principles of co-operative promotion.

A great variety of scenes is depicted, and all will be of decided interest to people who are inquiring about Utah. The subjects illustrated are the mines, the smelters, the sugar industry, cattle ranges, Lake Umbagog, Mt. Nebo, Logan canyon, Bear River canyon, Saltair, Brighton, the Lagoon, Fort Douglas, Provo City, Devil's Gate, American Fork, Temple Square, Lafayette school, St. Mary's Cathedral, Presbyterian Church, the Federal Building, the first house built in Salt Lake, several street scenes, the Fire Department, panoramic view of the city taken from the City & County building, and the statistics of the products of Utah for 1905. All these pictures, which are viewed nightly by large crowds, will be placed on exhibition throughout the country and seen by thousands of people in each place. To look at these views with the aid of a field or an opera glass is much the same thing as viewing the real objects themselves.

This machine will remain permanently in Salt Lake City at least for a year, and other Pacific coast scenery will be shown here each month.
