CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 27.—Anthony, from

the committee on printing, reported

favorably the House joint resolution

authorizing the public printer to furnish

all applicants with copies of bills,

reports and other public documents

heretofore printed by order of Congress

and distributed from the document

rooms, on such applications paying the cost of such printing

with 10 per cent. additional postage.

The bill for the relief of the heirs of

Constantine Brumidi passed.

Walker, from the committee on

public buildings, reported a substitute

for the House bill for the establishment

of titles in the House of Representatives

and for other purposes, placed on the

calendar.

Voorhes, from the committee on

libraries, submitted the annual report

of the Librarian of Congress, together

with a resolution providing for printing

the usual number of copies for distribution,

referred.

Morgan submitted a resolution

requesting the President to inform the

Senate what action should be taken under

the act of 1878 for the distribution of

copies of the reports of the Secretary of

War, and for other purposes, placed on the

calendar.

While considering the calendar,

the resolutions appropriations bill was

reached, but passed upon the suggestion

of Allison who has it in charge.

On motion of Voorhes (who had

previously objected to it) the bill to

relieve the Kansas colored emigrants

by admitting articles, duty free, sent them, was taken up. Voorhes

said it would pass.

Hayley moved an amendment that

such goods should be transported by the

government, and that the act should

be amended so as to include all the

goods of the colored men who are

being sent to the Territory. The

amendment was adopted.

Kirkwood thought it a singular

and unnecessary thing to make it

impossible for the colored men to

transport their own goods. He

thought it would be better to

allow them to transport their own

goods, and to make it a condition

that they should be transported by the

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least during the term of this

administration, he demanded any citizen

through the public press in language

of the foulest abuse, even though he

repeated this language to the President

in official form, against a decision

which justifies this construction.
