

for the past 24 hours at the Bon Rencontre hospital is as follows: Admitted, 9; cured, 4; deaths, 4; under treatment, 28. The record at Saint Mandries hospital for the same time: Admitted, 3; cured, 5; deaths, none; under treatment, 11.

The Minister of the Interior has sent to this point 44,500 francs to be distributed among the refugees.

St. PETERSBURG, 2.—The Siberian plague has appeared at Viborg, in Finland.

LONDON, 4.—The British brig *Belle Star* from Nova Scotia for Queenstown and the *Richard Owen* from Cardiff for St. Johns collided at sea. The *Owen* sank and four of her crew was drowned. The rest of the crew are at Queenstown.

LONDON, 4.—According to latest advices the Mahdi is now fighting the negro tribes around Geb-El-Gadr who refused to join him. It is asserted that he has dispatched a force to Khartoum under orders to take Gordon alive or dead. He has ordered the wells between ——— and Berber filled up. The Sultan of Zanzibar has sent a message to Gordon inviting him to Zanzibar.

MARSEILLES, 4.—The fact that the swallows, which migrated at the outbreak of the pestilence, have not yet returned, and that there are no sparrows at all in the city, is adduced as evidence that the atmosphere is still vitiated. This migration of birds has made a deep impression upon the public, and led to a demand for the purification of the atmosphere by bonfires.

St. Petersburg, 4.—A Nihilist press founded by Bogdanoff, who escaped from Siberia, was recently discovered at Saratoff. Bogdanoff suicided.

Vienna, 4.—Several earthquake shocks were felt yesterday at Faco, Bosnia.

Toulon, 4.—Four deaths from cholera here last night. The physicians fear that the return of the people to unhealthy lodgings will cause a fresh outbreak and possibly an outbreak of small-pox and typhoid fever.

Cardiff, 4.—The steamer *Richengy's* from Marseilles anchored in Penarth roads. Before leaving Marseilles four cases of cholera were sent from the vessel to Pharo Hospital. Dr. Raine, however, pronounces the steamer perfectly healthy.

LOCAL NEWS.

FROM SATURDAY'S DAILY, AUG. 2.

Armstrong writes from Elkton, Kentucky, asking for information respecting a man named William Winder, who, he thinks, is a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Obsequies.—The funeral of the late Orson K. Whitney took place at the residence of his brother, Horace K. Whitney, Eighteenth Ward, yesterday at 5 p. m. The proceedings were conducted by Elder Robert Patrick. Elder A. M. Musser opened by prayer. Elder Joseph C. Kingsbury made a few introductory remarks, and the funeral discourse was preached by President Joseph F. Smith. Benediction was pronounced by President S. B. Young. The remains were interred in the City Cemetery, Elder Kingsbury offering up the dedicatory prayer over the grave.

Pleasant Surprise Party.—A Scipio correspondent, "M. T.," writes as follows on the 30th of July: "Last evening the presidents and teachers of the Scipio Relief Society, accompanied by some of the brethren, making in all a company of about fifty, made a call upon Sister Sarah A. Robison, whose husband, Willis E. Robison, is upon a mission to the Southern States. When we arrived at her home she was absent, and upon returning, found the sisters in full possession, with tables plentifully spread with earth's bounties. A very sociable and pleasant evening was spent, all enjoying themselves exceedingly. The whole was supplemented with a very handsome subscription list of substantial assistance, which proved to Sister Robison that while her husband is absent faithfully preaching the Gospel, his wife and little ones are not forgotten by those at home.

The people of Scipio are generally feeling well. There is general good health, with prospects of bounteous crops.

The water supply is abundant, our reservoir holding back the fluid during fall and winter, and yielding its abundant store when most needed for our growing crops."

Returned.—A pleasant call was made at this office to-day by Elder Peter Lautensack, of Lehi, who returned last evening from a mission to the Northwestern States. He has been absent a trifle short of eighteen months, and labored most of the time among the German speaking inhabitants of the State of Minnesota, though he was for a short time in the city of Milwaukee. Brother Lautensack has been alone a good portion of the time and was blessed with considerable success, but has also had some trying experiences, the mission being a very hard one, and the feeling of the people toward us being quite ungenerous. During last winter he labored for about six weeks among a colony of Mennonites who are located in Cottonwood County, Minn. He made some friends who treated him hospitably and was even able to hold a series of meetings. But

his labors to cause the people to investigate were, so far as he knows, in vain, as the idea prevails among them that in the Bible they have the complete word of God, which renders further revelation unnecessary. Brother Lautensack returns in good health and spirits. He can look back with pride upon his mission, for we speak knowingly when we say he has exerted himself on all occasions to faithfully fulfill that which was required of him. We bid him a cordial welcome home.

From the North.—"Traveler" writes as follows from Brigham City, July 30th: This town as usual is very quiet, and at present business is dull. The woolen mills, that should be a service of wealth to the community are standing still. The tannery, which used to produce leather for the wear of the people is not in operation, and the import principle that is now draining our Territory of all its available currency and demoralizing trade, is being felt here as elsewhere. This town once took the lead in home production, but it is now lying back and letting the means that should be kept among us to build up and beautify our homes, go to build up other parts, where they are not interested in the material advancement of Utah.

I noticed a substantial improvement on the county road leading north, where a stone culvert was being put in over the creek.

A few small residences are being erected.

The crop prospects are good. Apples are not so good owing to the ravages of the moth, peaches are very good, plums and apricots quite plentiful.

A very good article of flour is being manufactured at the mill here. All are wishing for good times.

The same correspondent writing from Mendon, July 31, 1884, says: Mendon has not changed a great deal of late, but some improvements are in progress. A new addition to the Meeting house is being erected, which is an improvement that has long been wanted. Bishop Hughes is having a new house built.

The water supply to this town has been very abundant this season, many of the springs have increased in volume about as much again. Grain will be raised here as last. The weather is beautifully warm in the day and cool at night. All are busy as they can be harvesting. Many of the unemployed in Salt Lake City and other places could find work in these agricultural districts during the harvest season. Laborers are quite scarce here as many of the young men who did not own farms have gone to the Snake River country to locate for themselves—a wise move that many of the youth who are unemployed would do well to imitate. The exodus from this town has been quite extensive and all report themselves well satisfied with their prospects.
