

on Friday, October 3, 1890. He left home November 6, 1888, and labored in the East Tennessee Conference, which embraces East Tennessee and western North Carolina. He labored the first year as a traveling Elder, and was appointed to preside over the Conference in November, 1889. He was threatened by mobs but did not get into their hands. A spirit of inquiry has grown in that part of the country lately.

Elder Jens Jensen, of this city, returned from his mission to Denmark October 9th. He left Utah in January, 1889, and on his arrival in Denmark was appointed to preside over Aarhus Conference. He reports the condition of that mission as very good. About 200 persons have, during this time, joined the Church in the conference, as the result of the labor of five missionaries. The authorities have been friendly towards the Elders and many have testified to the ennobling influences of the Gospel upon the morals of men and women. Brother Jensen was the president of the last company of immigrants, consisting of 203 souls. They had a very pleasant journey all the way through, except an unnecessary delay of thirty hours in New York.

Z. C. M. I. Stockholders' Meeting

At 4:30 Saturday, October 4 a good representation of the Stockholders of Z. C. M. I. met in the office of the institution. The report of the president was read, which was of a highly satisfactory character. As there had been no stocktaking preparatory to the meeting, the exact profits could not be stated, but the sales for the half year just closed exceeded those of the corresponding half of 1889 by a quarter of a million dollars. This is a remarkably good showing.

Senator Hoar on the Manifesto.

Boston, October 8.—Senator Hoar yesterday expressed his gratification of the action of the Mormon church in abolishing polygamy as an article of faith. "But," he said, "I am not surprised that the leaders now see that the law of Congress is pressing them and that the Gentile element in Utah is growing too rapidly to permit a continuance of their odious practices. Twenty years ago, some one,

I think it was Oliver P. Morton, while traveling in Utah, told Brigham Young that it would be the best thing for him to have another revelation and then abolish polygamy. They have stood out as long as they could." Senator Hoar regards the action of the conference as confirmatory of his settled belief that all sectionalism will disappear as the Nation becomes homogeneous. "When you can talk with people by telephone," he said, "their prejudices and peculiar local influences will disappear. I think that is the way the Southern question is to be settled. Railway, telegraph, telephone, bringing people of all sections into close communication, are to sweep away provincialism and prejudice, and the nation will become one in sentiment on all great questions. "But," he said, "we will not admit Utah to Statehood."
