

# MORRIS BRIBERY CASE.

The Work of Empanelling Another Jury Began Today.

## LICENSE PREREQUISITES

Seem to Be Very Much Appreciated by Certain Classes—Failure to Collect.

An investigation of the workings of the license department of the city shows a reckless and deplorable state of affairs. The system as it is now maintained results in an annual loss of a great many thousands of dollars to the city treasury. Just how much is allowed to go by default cannot be accurately calculated through the counsel of the department, and backs up his statement by figures, showing the loss to be from \$100,000 to \$250,000. This he proposes to correct by the passing of an ordinance providing the license department from the treasurer's department.

In the event that it does certain conditions which are now enforced in business without having to pay license an extraordinary amount of it will be "quipped" up. The delinquent merchants, it is understood, are all extremely opposed to the proposed change of affairs. As it appears from six months to two years. Why they do not use a part of their earnings in the payment of their back license is a question for them to answer.
