Semi-Annual Dividend of Two-andone-Halt is Peclared.

Philadelphia, May 1 .- The board of directors of the Pennsylvania Railroad company today declared a semi-annual dividend of 214 per cent, payable on olders registered on the books at the close of business on

the fourth of May. No other business was transacted at the meeting. The announcement that only the regular dividend of 21/2 per cent was declared was a disappoint-ment to those who had expected that the increase of one-half per cent allowed to stockholders, six months ago, would be allotted today. It was ex-plained by an official of the company that it was customary to consider the question of the extra dividends only when the acounts for the year are made The company's fiscal year ends with November.

Mexican Central Meeting.

New York, May 1.-The Herald says: At the annual meeting of the Mexican Central railway in Boston today there will be no opposition to the election of the new interests which have secured control of the company. The present board of directors will be changed so as to admit the new element in control. Among the new interests which are expected to receive representation in the board are J. J. Mitchell, president of the Illinois Trust company of St. Louis and H. Clay Pierce of St. Louis, a director of the American Steel & Wire Others of the new interests are: C. D. Simpson, of Scranton, Pa., who is interested in the El Paso and Northwestern railroad which connects with the Rock Island, while Richard Olney and Nathaniel Thayer will represent the new Boston interests.
