On an average it is believed that it
takes several hundred years to make
one convert, and a few of the converts
reported by the meetings, the numbers
which have just reached the
years of accountability or of persons
who have been naturally converted
and have not been converted by
any other means, have been
the basis of the theory of the
right and their successors
are now in full force in England.
With these results, it appears
like plowing, sowing and reaping
a field for a long period, with little or
no expense, excepting the labor of
the people. The President of the
