

thought to have been subdued, broke out afresh yesterday where the men were at work, and drove all of them out; eighteen were brought up insensible from the effects of the gas, but all recovered. The fire is now worse than ever before.

CATASAUQUA, Pa., 3.—The rolling mills here, which have been idle since Oct., have resumed work, employing five hundred hands.

NEW YORK, 4.—Lui Lascula was fatally shot last evening by Joanna Vari; they had known each other a long time, but lately have not been on friendly terms.

Christian Meyer, one of the alleged Tompkins Square rioters, was placed on trial yesterday, on a charge of assaulting Sergeant Bergbold. The defendant's story was that the sergeant collared him while he was trying to get out of the way, and a policeman shouted, "Kill him." This, the prisoner understood to be an adjuration to his assailant, and he took out a hammer and struck him in self-defense. Afterwards, as before, he was unmercifully clubbed. In regard to the hammer he said he had been out of work at his trade for a long time, and had solicited odd jobs of work from house to house, in which he found it useful to have his claw hammer with him. The pink colored string shown with it had no significance, it had been used merely to secure the hammer in his pocket. He denied emphatically that he carried it as a weapon.

The representatives of the principal European steamship lines express themselves in strong terms against increasing the commutation tax on immigrants from one dollar and a half to two dollars, and hold that it is not fair for the State to be accumulating property at the expense of immigrants. Any increase in the commutation, with better facilities in other ports for loading or discharging vessels, the agents say, may send the vessels to those ports.

CINCINNATI, O., 4.—The excitement of the Woman's Whisky War is unabated throughout the State. In the most prominent of the interior towns prayer meetings are organized in bar rooms or on the sidewalks, and patrols are kept on through all kinds of weather. The ladies of Grunfield, Highland County, have inaugurated evening visits to the saloons at any hours from 6 to 10 o'clock, and the result is to empty each saloon by a rear door very suddenly as they enter by the front. At New Holland, Pickaway, Co., twenty-five ladies have volunteered for the crusade, they visit every shop daily. At Washington, Fayette Co., where the women initiated the movement, the liquor traffic has been entirely stopped. Charley Beck, whose saloon is outside the corporate limits, has been visited by ladies every day for nearly two weeks; he is a jolly German and treats the ladies kindly, but he refuses to accede to their propositions. The entire county is being scoured for signatures to the total abstinence pledge. At Gallipot, Gallia county, the ladies' brigade of active workers numbers 91; they work in three divisions, but have made but little headway with the saloon keepers, some of whom order them off their premises, and when they enter put out the lights. In most counties their success is marked.

BOSTON, 4.—Some coal sheds at South Boston fell this morning owing to the weight of snow, killing two men and seriously wounded two others.

HAMILTON, 3.—Last night an attempt was made to burn the various churches in this city; in the Primitive Methodist, Wesleyan, and Centenary churches, books, seats, etc., were piled together and set on fire, but burned out without damage to the buildings. St. Andrew's church, however, was more unfortunate, and was almost ruined. The incendiary also attempted, unsuccessfully, to set fire to the office of Wm. Rourke, lumber dealer.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 2.—Members of Parliament, to-day, were nominated without opposition by eighteen county and thirteen borough constituencies. In England and Wales twenty-six Conservatives and thirteen Liberals have been returned; three Liberals and two Conservatives have been returned in Scotland; six Conservatives, two home rulers and two Liberals in Ireland. No party has made any gains to-day, except the home rulers, in Kilkeny and Kearney counties.

Gladstone addressed five thousand people at New Cross to-day; he refuted the statement of Baron Rothschild, that the proposed remission of taxes would cause a loss to the revenue of £3,000,000 sterling, which would have to be made good by new taxation. He declared that the government placed reliance in the equitable adjustment of existing taxes and the practice of rigid economy. He called attention to the fact that the opposition leader would not promise a total abolition of the income tax, or any measure of relief for the general consumer. There was some fighting at Sheffield to-day, and the police was obliged to protect Mundella and Chamberlain, the Liberal candidates, from the violence of Roebuck's supporters.

The election to-day, at Cambridge University, West Norfolk and Mid-Lincolnshire, resulted in the return of six Conservatives without opposition; in the districts of Bedfordshire the vote was close, and the result was divided between the parties.

The Conservative candidate was elected in Wakefield by 188 majority, in place of Beaumont, late member, while Westbury, which was represented in the last Parliament by Phipps, a Liberal Conservative, returned a Liberal candidate by a majority of 22. Wholesale bribery is charged against the Conservatives at Wakefield, and a petition will be brought to unseat the member elect. In Warrington Peter Rylands, the former Liberal member, was defeated by a majority of 180. In '68 Rylands was returned by only 27 majority. Whalley, the friend of the Tichborne claimant, is re-elected in Peterborough. Two Liberal members are returned from Macclesfield. The voting at Bristol, to-day, was very close, both parties claiming the victory; the counting of the votes is not yet completed. Thomas Hughes has withdrawn from the election in Marylebone, submitting to the opinion of the Attorney General, that his chances of success were not equal to those of Grant, the other Liberal nominee. Hughes asked for and accepted the decision of the Attorney General to avoid the division of the party and its possible defeat in Marylebone.

The floor of a factory in Bury, Lancashire, where a Liberal meeting was being held, gave way yesterday, and precipitated a large number of people to the story below; six were killed, and it is feared that many were fatally injured.

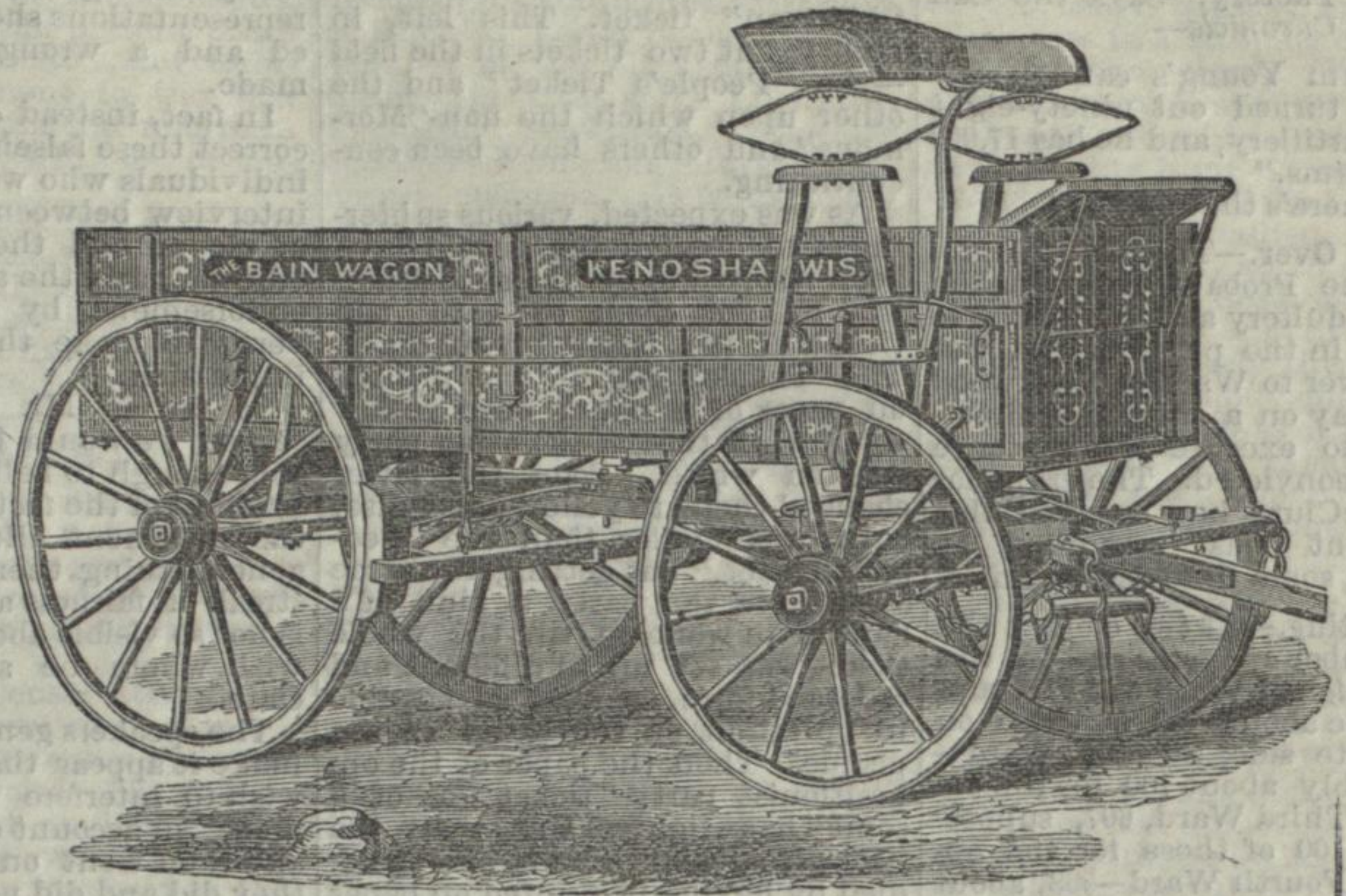

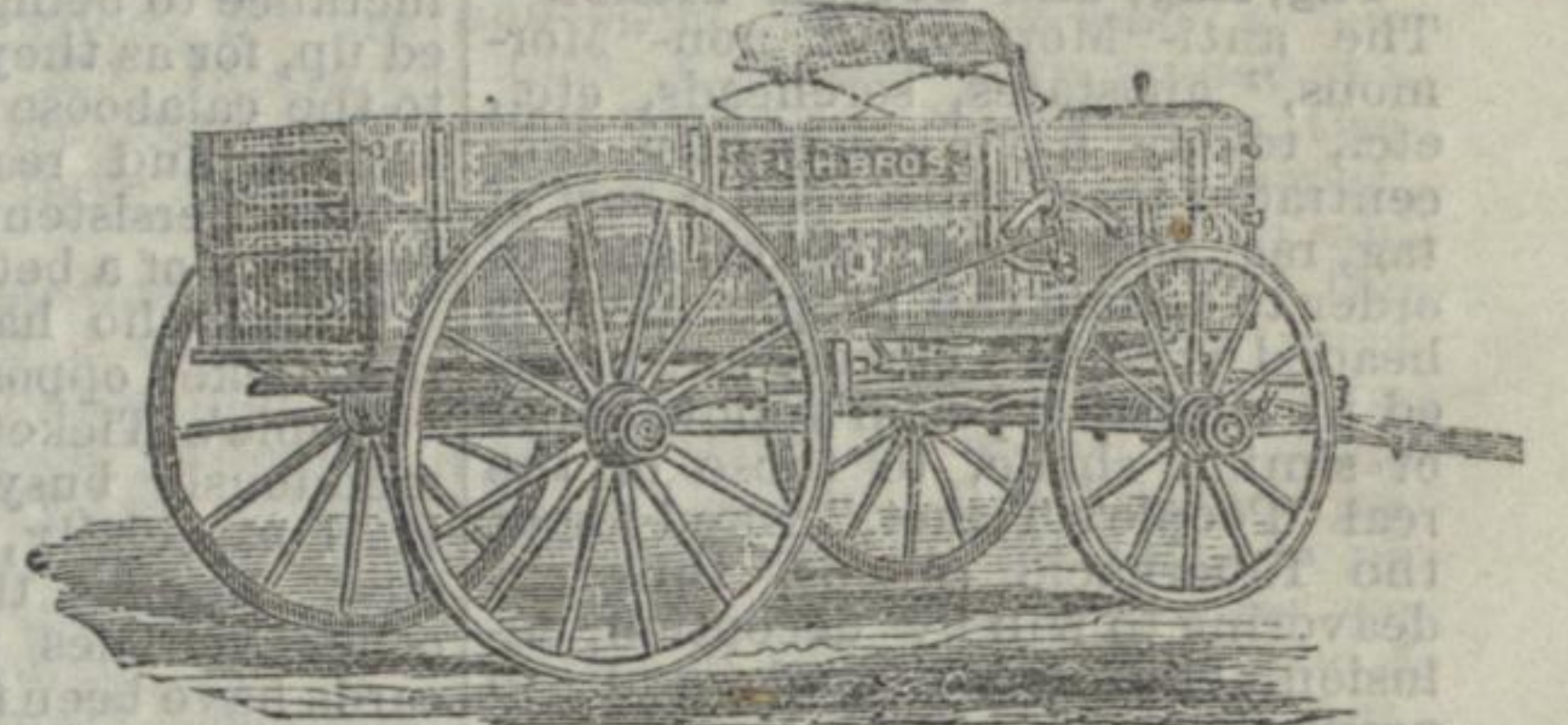
