LOCAL BRIEFS.

Surveyors Discharged—The Utah Southern railway is nearly complete and has discharged half of its corps of surveyors.

Improving State Street—The Utah Light & Railway company is erecting trolley standards on State street, preparatory to removing the street poles.

Cherries are ripe—Utah cherries are now in the market, retailing at 15 cents a pound, with Utah strawberries also at hand selling at two boxes for a quarter.

Heaton Wins Prize—Harold Heaton was awarded last evening the Breeden drafting prize of the association of the Y. M. C. A., with John Yunker a close second.

St. Mary's Commencement—Invitations are out for the commencement exercises of St. Mary's academy next Friday evening under the auspices of the Sisters of the Holy Cross.

Hammond to Accompany Taft—Word has been received in this city, that John H. Hammond, professor of mining engineering at Yale, will accompany President Taft to Salt Lake at the time of the August commencement of the G. A. R.

Fine Cattle For Slaughter—Harry B. Jones of Los Angeles unloaded yesterday afternoon in this city, a train load of unusually fine grass cattle, fattened at Santa Rosa, they were shipped to Kansas City for slaughter.

Capitol Vote Convassed—The county commissioners counted the vote of the capitol building election yesterday. It showed that in Salt Lake county there was a total of 3,196 votes, of which 1,113 were in favor of the proposition and 463 against it.

To Publish Greek Magazine—John Georgiades, formerly associate editor of the "Pravda," is to publish a Greek weekly newspaper, to be published in Greek magazine which will appear here July 1, next. It will be monthly of 20 to 24 pages with four or five pages in English and the remainder in Greek.

Picnic at Liberty Park—The Sunday school of the Unitarian church will hold its annual picnic Friday at Liberty Park. The members of the school will meet at the children's playground at 10 o'clock, and will bring his lunch, which will be served at 12:30. Ice cream will be furnished by the teachers. Games and races will be started at 2:30.

Kansas Commander Here—Col. J. H. Rickett, commander of the department of Kansas G. A. R., is in the city making arrangements for the entertainment of the members of his department during the forty-third annual encampment of the Columbia university and Mike A. Van Starr Harris of Rochester, N. Y.

Bears in Yellowstone—International Secretary J. M. Thompson of the Y. M. C. A. has returned from a trip to the Yellowstone. He reports bear in profusion at the park, red, black, cinnamon and other kinds too numerous to mention. The guards warn visitors to keep away from the animals. One lady insisted on feeding a bear peanuts, but was prevented by two guards from going up to the bear with the bag. However she dropped the peanuts on the ground where a brown bear could see them. He ran to the satisfaction of seeing the bear come and eat the peanuts up. The donor did not wait to receive a card of thanks.

State Teachers' Convention—The executive committee of the State Teachers' association held a meeting yesterday and decided that the convention would be held in the tabernacle in Salt Lake on Dec. 27, and continue for three days. There will be six general sessions and two half-days will be given over to department work. The speakers who have been arranged for are: Prof. Thomas Ballaet of the University of New York; Dr. Henry Suzzillo of Columbia university; and Mike A. Van Starr Harris of Rochester, N. Y.

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TO ALLOW STOPOVERS ON ENCAMPMENT TRIP

Commander-in-Chief Henry Nevius Sends Good News to Col. F. M. Stierrett.

Stop over privileges will be allowed on all tickets west of Denver, Pueblo or Cheyenne, within transit limit of Sept. 1, and on return trip at any point west of Chicago or St. Louis, final return limit, is the information received by Col. Stierrett, executive director of the G. A. R. encampment. The information was contained in a communication from Henry M. Nevius, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army, who was notified of this effect by the C. L. Hunter, vice chairman of the Central Utah association. The news will be read with pleasure by all who contemplate visiting the encampment in August. The communication follows: Referring to our letter to you of April 12 and previous correspondence, beg to advise that in accordance with additional arrangements of western passenger lines account above mentioned, the trunk lines have supplemented their authorization in connection therewith as follows: Stop-overs will be allowed on going trip, at points west of and including Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo or Cheyenne within going transit limit of Sept. 1 and on return trip stop-overs to be allowed at any point west of Chicago or St. Louis within final return limit.
