Ogden School Census Shows Net Increase of 219-Coal Shgrtage Causes Alarm-Police Court.

Orden, Aug 10 -An attempt of four prisoners occupying cell No. 7 of the county jail to escape early yesterday morning was baffled by a message from another prisoner to the sheriff, notifying him to lay in watch for the men all night. Before the sheriff's force made any move to stop the men they had cut a hole a foot square in the wall of the cell and one of them had climbed through into the corridor.

About three days ago the men began working with the saw upon the steel cage, but they did their work so quietly cage, but they did their work so quietly that hardly anyone in the jail knew it, the noises of the saw being deafened by the application of soap. The hole was near the floor and was large ensuigh for the largest of the men to crawl through. When one of the pris-oners climbed through this hole he could swing the levers which opened the doors of the other cells, releasing the men into the outer hall. The saw-ing through of four bars of an outer window would have set every man free. The window through which the escape was to be made was the one just above the bathtub. ## DEATH OF JAMES ROBBINS.

**Oldest Pioneer Citizen Closes Remark**able Career-A Veteran of Nauvoo.

able Career-A Veteran of Nauvoo. Kaysville, Davis Co., Aug. 9.-After a two months' illness, James Robbins the oldest man in Kaysville, and one be-loved by all who know him, passed away at the ripe age of \$2. The deceased was a ploneer of Utah, coming here in 1851, and has been identified with the growth of Kaysville since its first settlement. Mr. Robbins was born in Apperley, Gloucestershire, England, Jan. 18, 1815, When the late President Wilford Wood-ruff was on his first settlement. Is 1815, When the late President Wilford Wood-ruff was on his first mission for the Mormon Church in England he traveled through Gloucestershire and made con-verts to the then newly organized Church by the hundreds. Mr. Robbins was one of about 1,800 that were baptized into the Church at that time. A few years later he came to America, and after spending some time with the saints in Nauvoo, up to the time of their ex-pulsion, he came west and made his home in Utah, residing a year or so in Sait Lake and then sottling permanently in what is now West Kaysville, where he
