PECULIAR FREAK OF NATURE. Contiguous Hot and Cold Springs , Descret News Agency.

Special Correspondence. Lodi, Freemont Co., Idaho, Sept. 24 .-The postoffice of this little hamlet is just south of the north fork of the Snake river, three and a half miles west from Marysville. Here your correspondent met one of the queer freaks of nature. On the Cunningham ranch are springs of fresh water with-in short distances of each other that are alternately hot and cold. The up-

per spring is cold, hard water; four rods below is a warm spring, the water rous below is a warm spring, the water being comfortably warm enough to bathe in and is quite soft, while farther down the same draw is another cold water spring. The hot water has no bad taste or smell. It all appears to come from a volcanic strata.

The water for irrigation has held this district back but as a rule good crops have been produced without water, but the last two years have been er, but the last two years have er, but the last two years have been very dry. Good crops have been produced by cultivation and care, in the garden of J. T. Docheus was raised carrots, beets, turnips, onions, cabbage and splendid potatoes, all without water, but with the application of water the grantity could be quantity could be greatly increased. It is expected that there will be water it is expected that there will be water to put on the ranches next year. Then great improvement can be expected. The soil is a rich, sandy loam underlaid with lava that will readily sub-irrigate when the water is applied. In places half a mile east of here the land has
