## UNCLE SAM BARS

## DANCE-HUGGING

War Department Issues Orders That Young Officers Do Not Like.

## CAUSES ALARM AT FT. DOUGLAS

Past Experience Has Shown the Necessity of Abolishing "Close Quarters" Conduct.

"Cadets dancing with ladies must dance with their left arm extended, and under no circumstances will they be allowed to bend the right elbow so as to draw their partners close to them."

The above is an order just issued by the war department to regulate the social conduct of the young men of the national military academy at Fort Douglas this morning through the camp at the world's fair. Just how it will be received at Fort Douglas and elsewhere throughout the country is not known. The first news came publicly to Salt Lake this morning through the medium of a number of eastern newspapers though the order had been received at Fort Douglas in advance.

It is thought probable here that there may be a general order making the prohibition apply wherever Uncle Sam's young heroes are located. Heretofore it has been left largely to the individual military academy to regulate the social conduct of the Christian churches and to other moralists to cry down the dance hug as an evil that should be abolished. It now appears that it has been received in Colorado the Denver Post says:

The young officers, and the older ones as well, at Fort Logan are quaking in their boots at the order. The dancing pumps in fear that the war department will include Fort Logan in a blanket order which may be issued, affecting the entire military service.

Uncle Sam has a deep regard for his soldier boys and an interest in their social behavior. When he is aware that his military representatives are gentlemen, Uncle Sam wants to be sure that the bounds of propriety are not passed.

It is no more strange for Uncle Sam to say to his younger men, "You must wear, and how they shall be worn."

The order, of course, will be obeyed, but the mere issue of the order is the opinion that if they should desire to hold their partners a little closer, if the latter did not object, and clasp their arms about their waists, they should be allowed to do so without having the war department interfere.

The officers at the headquarters of the department of Colorado smile and look wise, but decline to discuss the edict.

"We have no right to criticize the orders emanating from any branch of the department," is the way one of the officers with the single bar of a lieutenant on his shoulders, evaded the question.

Just what the young ladies who desire to have a handsome suitor in army blue guide them through the mazes of a dreamy waltz, think about the order, remains an open question. Some of them, however, have no hesitancy in condemning the autocratic action of Uncle Sam.
