Harriet Thylor-Upton of Warren, O., treasurer of the as-sociation, announced that the yearly re-ports showed cheouraging results all along the line. Alice Stone Blackwell of Boston, editor of the Woman's Journal, said: "It may not be known here, but Miss Kate M. Gordon of New Orleans, who is bere to attend the convention, is the only woman who has a record of having legal-ly voted 300 times in one day.
