The apricot crop is rather shy, owing The apriced crop is rather shy, owing to late spring frosts. The sweet cher-ries were also killed by frost. With these exceptions, and the pear crop, the season's yield of fruit will be a handsome one. The strawberries are about gone, and the red raspberry harvest is about half marketed; black caps and dewberries are just coming in, with promise of a very heavy crop of each. Peaches and apples promise well. The frost and wind left enough peaches on the trees to mature a banner crop without the necessity of thinning. Water for irrigation is scarce in and ground Brigham City. To partly com-

pensate for this the orchardists are in general saved the necessity of much trinning as the trees make but little annual growth, just enough to keep thrifty and produce enough bearing wood to produce a good crop. PEAR BLIGHT WORKS HAVOC.

The pear crop of this city and vicinity is practically a failure, and what is worse, nearly every pear true in every orchard, both young and old, is so seriously affected with blight that pear growing is believed to be doomed. Large orchards, covering an area in some instances of 10 or 12 acres, which normally should be netting the owner
