IMMENSE OUTPUT OF CANNERIES

Over \$300,000 Disbursed in Weber County for Tomatoes And Help.

ETHERINGTON COMPANY.

Meeting of School Boards Proposed—Japanese Firm Corporation—District Court Matters.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—The operators of the 11 canning factories in Weber county have made an estimate of this year's run, which shows a wonderful output of canned goods to be sent to all parts of the west. During the season it is estimated that nearly 600,000,000 cases of two-and-one-half-pound cans of goods were put up. Over one-half of this immense output was canned tomatoes, the balance being divided between small vegetables and fruits. For tomatoes alone the factories paid out over \$300,000, and to employees over \$100,000. The farmers received a raise on tomatoes this year, the price paid for most of the yield being \$10 per ton at the factories. The season was an ideal one for tomatoes, as there was plenty of moisture and the summer was long, giving the crop ample time to ripen. More attention was directed to the canning of all kinds of fruits, the output for fruit by the canning factories was about \$55,000. Utah canned goods are being called for throughout the country because of their delicious flavor. The principal market for Weber county's canned goods has been Nevada, Idaho, Colorado and Wyoming.

ETHERINGTON AND SONS CO.

Thomas Etherington and Children Form a Corporation.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—Thomas Etherington, son of the best known residents of Weber county, and his children have formed a corporation to be known as the Thomas Etherington and Sons company. They have incorporated for a period of 20 years, and propose making West Weber, Weber county, their principal place of business. The capital stock is divided into 500 shares of the par value of \$100 each. The greater part of the capital stock has been paid up by the transfer to the corporation of real estate, cattle, horses and other personal property valued at \$35,000. The business of the company will be to manufacture and dispose of all kinds of merchandise, farm and dairy products to buy, sell and raise livestock, etc. The officers elected to serve during the ensuing year are Thomas Etherington, president; James A. Etherington, vice president; Susan A. McFarland, secretary and treasurer; and they, with John N. Etherington and Mary E. McFarland, form the board of directors.

school teachers convention. At this meeting matters of importance pertaining to school government will be discussed. The meeting will no doubt be largely attended.

OFFER OF CLUBS ACCEPTED.

Male Teachers Will Have Headquarters At Weber and Ellis Clubs.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—The tendering of the male school teachers of the state who are coming to Ogden for the purpose of attending the annual convention during the convention to be held here Jan. 1, 2, 3 and 4, has been gratefully accepted by the committee in charge. The committee will make centrally located places where the visiting pedagogues may spend their leisure hours. Arrangements have about been completed with the hotels, rooming houses and private families for rooms for the 1,800 teachers, who are expected in Ogden on those days.

JAPANESE INCORPORATE.

A Strong Company Formed by Orientals.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—A \$100,000 corporation has been launched in Ogden to be known as the Continental Supply company, and this city will be its headquarters. The incorporators are all Japanese, who have been conducting business in Ogden for considerable time. The stock of the company is valued at \$100 per share. The company will conduct a large general merchandising business; also commission and produce, the buying and selling of real estate, buying bonds and mortgages. The officers are T. Komada, of San Francisco, president; B. F. Nishimura, vice president; H. Seno, secretary and treasurer.

AS TO CHRISTMAS TREES.

Not Permitted to be Cut in Ogden Canyon.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—The property owners of Ogden canyon have combined in a movement to stop the cutting down of Christmas trees or other trees in the canyon, as in the years that are past by people desirous of having a Christmas tree, the canyon has been robbed of that which helps to make it the most beautiful mountain scenery in the west. Nearly every foot of ground in the canyon is now owned by corporations or private individuals, who realize that to retain the natural beauty of the canyon, the cutting down of trees must be stopped. Fair warning is given everybody that no more Christmas trees can be taken from Ogden canyon and in order that the law will be complied with, watchmen will be on the lookout continually for violators of the law.

HORN LOST SUIT.

C. R. Thompson Divorced—Case of Cortez vs. Thomas.

A. G. Horn against the Great Western Salt & Soda company was heard. The prosecution endeavored to show that Mr. Horn was employed by the Salt company to represent them as counsel in various suits in the courts and that the fees due him amounted to \$1,000. The jury took a different view of the case and brought in a verdict against the plaintiff.

THOMPSON DIVORCE.

The divorce suit of Charles R. Thompson vs. Lilla Thompson was heard and decided in favor of the plaintiff on the grounds of desertion and infidelity. The defendant according to testimony having run away with a man named Brown. They were married at Salt Lake City, May 14, 1905.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—E. E. Stewart, local manager of the Simmons Hardware company of St. Louis, accompanied by his wife and daughter, have left Ogden for Honolulu, to be gone several weeks. Mr. Stewart is going principally on business for the company. Up to the present time at least, the people have been doing a large business at Honolulu and vicinity through agents, which has netted them a neat profit considering the heavy freight expenses and time lost in shipment. While there Mr. Stewart will look over the field for the purpose of determining whether it would pay the company to establish a large house at Honolulu. On his return he will meet the officers of the company and make a report on the situation.

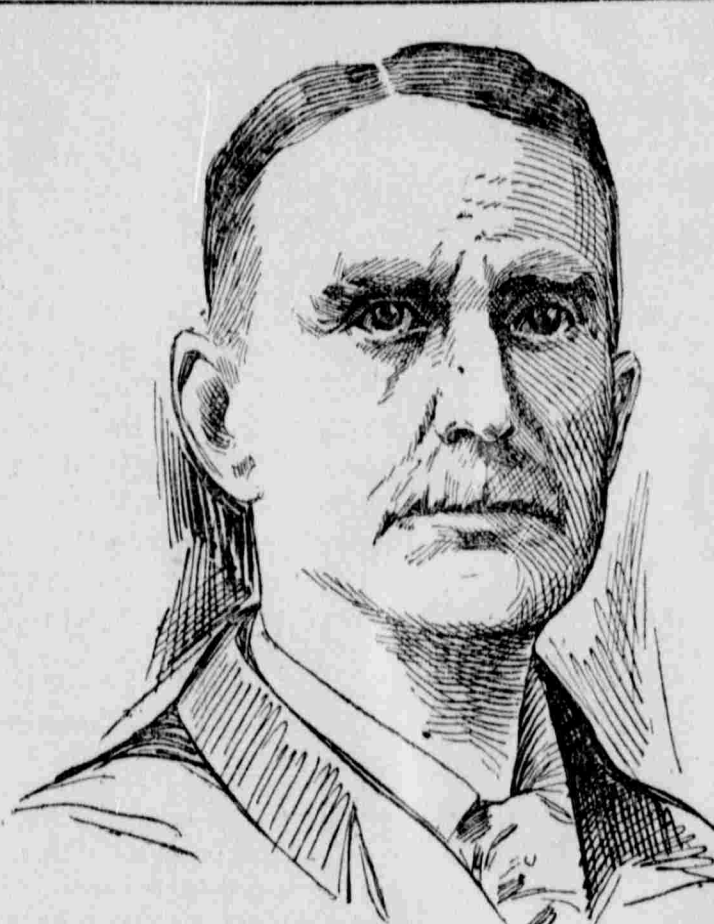

PNEUMONIA AT IDAHO FALLS CAUSED BY COAL FAMINE.

IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 13.—Several cases of pneumonia are now in evidence here and are said to be caused by the inability of people to get fuel with which to keep their houses warm. It is impossible to get sufficient coal in Idaho Falls, although people are now conning the habit of going into the railroad yards and helping themselves. On Wednesday the railroad company had several people arrested charged with stealing coal. It develops that some parties had the temerity to steal coal from the cars and then sell it. This was a little too brazen and public sentiment seems to be that what it is not a great and overwhelming sin for parties to steal fuel for their own use in time of suffering, the stealing of coal for ultimate sale is going too far and those indulging in this practice should be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.
