The first marriage took place in St. Louis in 1850. Mrs. Parsons brought suit for divorce in California in 1893 but the decree was granted to Parsons on a cross complaint. They were married again in Denver in 1901. Last year Mrs. Parsons brought suit for separate maintenance in the Third District court.

Breen asks for an accounting and \$7,500 with interest at 8 per cent from Aug. 7, 1907.

A MOTHER'S COMPLAINT.

Her Son Sent to Prison for Twelve Years-Cites Another Case.
