King Oscar Indisposed.

Stockholm, Feb. 8.—King Oscar is indisposed and unable to transact state business. At today's session of the council of state he handed over the reins of government to Crown Prince Gustaf until further notice. This is not the first time that King Oscar, who is 76 years old, has been indisposed.

Sixty-Seven Kinds of Mosquitoes.

Blake, governor of Ceylon, has announced at a meeting of the Asiatic society, according to a Times dispatch from Colombo, Ceylon, that the chief Singapore medical officer of the sixth century described 67 varieties of mosquitoes and 42 kinds of malarial fever caused by mosquitoes.
