Elder George A. Smith addressed the congregation, saying it is enough to try the lungs of a giant to speak to this immense congregation. Alluded to the church on the 6th of April, 1830, when it was organized with six members, and now those few have increased to a great and mighty people. Referred to the first cause which produced the exterminating order of Governor Boggs in Missouri. Exhorted the people to make good fences, to save forage, and provide comfortable shelter for cattle in winter, and spoke upon other matters of policy. Compared the blessings of health we enjoy with the sickness in Jilinois and Missouri.
