Washington, Oct. 7.—During the last fa-cal year, according to the annual report of Gen. George B. Davis, indge advocat-general of the arms, issued today, 4,59; trials by general court-martial were held. Fifty of these trials were of command of-ficers, 42 of whom were convicted and eight acquitted. Fourteen officers were dismissed by sentence. In four cases the sentences were commuted to loss of rank-in two cases resignations "for the good of the service" were accepted in lieu of ornfirming the sentences, and in one case the sentence was disapproved. About 30 per cent of the enlisted men-covicied by general court-martial re-ceived sentences involving dishonorable discharge and about 5 per cent of thes sentences were awarded in view of pra-vious convictions.

vious convictions. The trials by general court-martial dur-ing the year showed a decrease 204 as compared with the previous year.

NO HOUSES BURNED.

New York, Oct. 8 .- Advices received New York, Oct. S.-Advices received from Havana state that amazing little damage occurred as a result of the in-surrection in Havana province, where much of the fighting was done. There are no burned houses or burns, no ruined crops or devastated fields. In this respect, it is stated, it was the cheapest revolution in West Indian his-tory. Farmers everywhere have re-turned to their fields.

CAVALRY FOR CUBA.

Newport News, Va., Oct. 7 .-- With two Newport News, Va., Oct. 7.--With two squadrons, headquarters and band of the Fifteenth cavalry aboard, the army transport Panama salled this morning for Havana, Asst. Havana, Oct. 7.-The last organized body of rebels in Havana province was dispanded this evening at Alquizar, when 350 members of the force under Gen, del Castillo turned over 180 guns to Maj. Ladd of the disarmament com-Maj. Ladd was at San Antonio de los

Maj, Land was at San Antonio de los Banos this afternoon when he learned that this force at Alquizar was threat-ening trouble over the question of whether they or the 40 volunteers garrisoning Alquizar should be the first to surrender their arms. Maj. Ladd has-tened to the town, where he met Gov. Numez and American Consul Gen. Stein-hart, who had come down from Ha-vana. It was arranged to disarm the ex-rebels and volunteers simultaneous-ly. This was done without a hitch and then both sides and the towns people folined in a feast of merrymaking over the wind-up of the revolution,

The police at Guiria were disbanded today preparatory to disarming the two detachments of ex-rebels under Del Castillo brothers tomorrow. These two small forces are reported to be stealing cattle and horses. The mayor of Guina has requested the presence of 20 Ameri-can soldiers, who will be sent there.

COLOMBIA INCLINED TO RECOGNIZE PANAMA.

New York, Oct. 1.-Dr. Enrique Cor-tez, who has been appointed by Presi-dent Rafael Reyes of Colombia as minister to the United States to suc-ceed Diego Mendoza, and who is stay-ing here, said tonight: "We are not disinclined to recognize the Panama republic, but there are ex-tain terms to be compiled with first. "Colombia has done well under the wise administration of President Reyes, and his task of reconciling to the gov-erganizing and strengthening our finances has been highly auccessful, and after some years of turmoll we are at last assured of a long term of perce. Co-lombia is auxious that there should exist between her and the United States -spirit of comity and friendship even granter, and our esteem for President Roosevelt as a man of shoure motives and he highest integrity is of the strong-ent.
