SUMMER SCHOOL.

Supt. Nelson Mails Circulars to All the County Superintendents.

State Superintendent of Schools Nelson is today mailing circular letters to all of the county superintendents of the state calling their attention to the arrangements being made for the summer school to be held at the University of Utah from June 6 to 18 of this year. A copy of the letter in full follows:

"I have no doubt that you share with me a feeling of anxiety for the success of the summer school to be held from June 6-18 of this year at the University of Utah. The managers of the school are confidently and consistently expecting the active co-operation of the su-perintendents in securing an unusually large attendance of teachers

"It will be remembered that at our department meeting last year of the State Teachers' association, the superintendents unanimously decided that the University authorities be requested to keep their training school open dur-ing the summer school session, that the teachers of the state might have an opportunity of coming in actual contact with the expert work of the training chool while pursuing their summer school studies. As soon as the Univer sity authorities granted this request of the superintendents, the management of the summer school became deter-mined to secure some of the best available talent in the United States. It has done so. It has secured the services of mass done so. It has secured the services of Dr. George E. Vincent, dean of the fac-uity and general manager of the Chau-tauqua school, and the services of Mrs. Alice P. Norton, professor of economics in the University of Chicago. Both of these educators are of international rep utation. Dr. Vincent is one of the most cholarly and entertaining lecturers of the day. In her profession, Mrs. Nor-ton also is easily in the ranks of the She will handle domestic econo mics and other subjects vitally connect ed with the life of the home and the

school. "The expenses of the teachers who attend the summer school will be re-duced to the minimum. The management is securing rooms and lodging places at reduced rates. It will provide luncheon at the University buildings at cost, and it will freely render any legitimate service within its power for the benefit of our teachers. The summer school circular containing all necessary information will be printed and sent to you for distribution next week

"With these conditions before us, I feel that no superintendent can be at case until he knows that every teacher under his direction who can attend the summer school will do so."
