SALT LAKE COUNTY T.X

The State Supreme Court has handed down an opinion, in which it is held that the State board of equalization has authority to raise or lower the valuation, but that in its recent action in raising the valuation of Salt Lake county property the board did not adopt the right method to make the raise and therefore its action is void void.

The opinion was in the case of the State of Utah, ex rel, J. A. Cunning-ham et al, vs the State board of equalization. The opinion discusses provisions of the Constitution and also

provisions of the Constitution and also the statutory enactments relating to the question and concludes: We think the provisions' of section 83, respecting the classification of tax-able property, mandatory. Such being the case, it was the duty of the board, when it found that the property of Salt Lake county was assessed too low, before making any order, to de-termine how much the valuation on the real estate ought to be raised, how much that of the improvements thereon, and how much that of the personal property, respectively, so as to make all the valuations conform to the constitutional standard, and then the constitutional standard, and then to make an order accordingly. The statute not having been pursued, the order was defective.
