ANOTHER BURGLARY. - Last night the premises occupied by John Swenson, boot and shoe maker, and John Liljenstrom, tallor, on Second South Street, were barglariously entered by some person or persons, and robbed of a quantity of goods. The goods stolen were principally fine cloths, belonging to Mr. Liljenstrom, his

cloths, belonging to Mr. Liljenstrom, his loss amounting to something over a hun-dred dollars. Two pairs of boots, worth about thirty-five dollars, belonging to Mr. Swenson, were also stolen. The premises were entered by a window on the west side of the building. The win-dow was secured by shutters on the outside which were fastened by an iron bolt on the inside. To gain ingress the robbers wrenched the hinges from one of the shut-ters. Among the goods stolen were a pair of pants which a young man had purchased yesterday and taken to Mr Liljenstrom to have altered. The robbery must have been committed

The robbery must have been committed between the hours of seven and midnight, as a young man, named Sillander, who is employed by Mr. Liljenstrom, and who sleeps on the premises, went out about seven and returned at or near twelve o'clock

The robbers have not yet been captured.

Two MEMORIALS .- "Washington, Feb. 23. The President to-day received the memorial of the Gentile citizens of Utah, endorsing the course of District Attorney able and a favorite machine. Bates, of that Territory, as being calculated
