Interstate Commerce Commission Renders a Decision in The Express Case.

SETS OCTOBER 1 AS LIMIT

Companies Given Until That Date to File a New Basis of Rates On Packages.

(Special to the "News.") Washington, D. C., July 16 .- A deislon in the Boise express case, which applies also to irregularities of express rates to Utah points, has been renhered by the interstate commerce comrates charged by the Adams and other express companies for delivery of packdecision gives the companies until Oct. It is file a new basis of rates on packages weighing from eight to 47 pounds. The commission stpulates ages from New York to Boise. The The commission stpulates that the rate shall not exceed the lowest combination of locals over the shortest reasomable express routing between New York and Boise. The present rates, the commission says, in almost every in-fance violate the general principle laid fown for regulation of rates under the interstate commerce act. The commis-sion also holds that companies may not differentiate between charges on packages prepaid and those on which charges are collected on delivery. For instance, eight-pound packages, if prepaid in New York, were transmitted to Boise for \$1.28, while on the same package, if expressage is paid at destination, the charge is \$2.20. The commission holds: "The shipper is justified in demanding the lower of the two rates, and the carrier may not legally demand or collect more. The lower rate is reasonable, or at least not unreasonably low, because it is the voluntary rate of the carrier."

The commission holds that the express companies may demand prepayment on all packages, if they so desire, but after Oct. I they can have but a single rate between the two differentiate between charges on pack

In conclusion, the commission says that the condition of rate-making that that the condition of rate-making that has prevailed among express companies is unknown in railroad freight business, and adds: "The system must be developed by which express rates shall conform to the standards to which the railroads have in great measure conformed and which the law enjoins."


