ecial Correspondence. Midway, Wasatch Co., May 19.-This place is famous for its hot springs, or hot pots, as they are called, owing to the peculiar formation of each spring. through the deposit of lime from the springs.

Some of the pots are still in course of formation, others are dry. They are indeed great natural curiosities, extending over a space of about four by five miles of country, bordered on the south and east by the Provo river, and on the north and west by the towering peaks of the Wasatch range. J. P. Gunn, who is promoting the b! cycle road race to Leran on the 30th announces that the entry list will close Saturday night. A number of riders have entered, from Ogden this week and more are expected from there and Mr. Gunn says that a Chinaman in Salt Lake has expressed a desire to compete in the race.

How Ladies Should Ride. "There goes a woman who knows how to ride a wheel," said an agent whose tore overlooks a cycling thoroughfare. 'You will notice," he continued, "that she rides quite easily, and that from the waist up her body does not move. It is maintained glways directly over the center line of her blcycle; that is why the front wheel runs straight and does not swing from side to side as you notice it with so many women riders, and even with a great many men cyclists also. Neither does she lunge forward with her shoulders at each

pressure of the pedals.
"What is the result She maintains a smooth, even, steady gait, and seems to be riding without effort. She is getting all the speed out of the wheel that she is capable of, an if she practiced the objectionable tactics that I have mentioned she would not be able to ride so fast or so far. You will also notice how rapidly her feet are moving. It is plain that she is riding a low gear wheel, possibly 60.

"Right there lies one of the greatest troubles women cyclists have. The gears are altogether too high. In the effort to keep up with their stronger brethren, women cyclists are riding gears anywhere from 70 to 84. Whether through carclessness or because they think there is demand for them, most makers are equipping women's wheels with gears above 70. This reprehensible practice will eventually do more to unpopularize the bleycle than any amount of talking will undo. as the point where cycling is an easy exercise is passed, harm is being done. exercise is passed, harm is being done. When a woman looks graceful on a wheel, in nine cases out of ten the fault lies in the gear of her bleyele. In the years when a gear in the neighborhood of 60 was considered high for a woman, there were far more women riding wheels than there are today. I would advocate the use of 52 gear for a woman who finds difficulty in pushing a higher one. It is foolish to argue that it is not pleasanter to make more revolutions of

pleasanter to make more revolutions the pedal with less muscular effort. "If agents would only realize when they are defeating their own interests when they advise big gears for wo-men's wheels I think they would stop it. Doctors realize that bicycle riding, as long as it does not become too great a strain upon a woman's physique, is the finest exercise in the world for them. Its main point of excellence or other sports lines in the absence of effort and in the exhibitration the rapid motion produces. This, of course, is increased as the wheel runs easier, and is lost as it runs hard. Women should never ride a wheel heavier than twentyfive pounds, and it should be kept ways in the easiest running condition. Most of all, they should reject all device tending to increase the size of the
