

## RHYOLITE HAS A DOUBLE TRAGEDY

Steve O'Brien, a Miner, Shoots And Kills His Wife, Who Sought Divorce.

### PULLED GUN ON THE SHERIFF.

Was About to Shoot When Officer Fired and He Dropped Dead.

Goldfield, Nev., May 18.—Rhyolite, the principal town in the Bullfrog district, was the scene today of a double tragedy. Steve O'Brien, a miner, shot and killed his wife.

Deputy Sheriff McDonald attempted to disarm and arrest O'Brien, who drew a revolver and was about to shoot, when McDonald fired and O'Brien dropped dead.

The shooting occurred at the Hotel Golden on Goldfield street. Steve O'Brien had been on bad terms with his family for some time and his wife was about to proceed to get a divorce.

He entered the house today and, after a few heated words, shot his wife in the face. She was carried to a drugstore where she died.

O'Brien came out of the lodging house where he lived. In the meantime a crowd surrounded the place, and preparations were made to mob and hang him. Deputy Sheriff McDonald and Justice of the Peace John Donnelly rushed to the scene.

O'Brien was attempting to make his escape, carrying a pistol in one hand and a miner's candlestick in the other. Deputy Sheriff McDonald fired his pistol and candlestick he refused and made an effort to shoot. McDonald anticipated him and shot him through the heart. O'Brien dropped dead in his tracks.

### CRAZY MAN DESTROYS MUCH S. P. PROPERTY.

Los Angeles, May 18.—Ten thousand dollars' worth of Southern Pacific property was destroyed by a supposed lunatic named Hancock at Ingle, in San Bernardino county, last night. He smashed and burned everything that lay in his path until he was finally captured.

Of Hancock nothing is known today. He left there about 7:45 o'clock last night, walking along the Southern Pacific track west toward Edom, smashing all the switch lights on the way. Between Ingle and Edom, a distance of about 12 miles, which he made in quick time, Hancock shattered seven signal lamps.

At Edom there was nobody in the roundhouse, and he set fire to the building. It was totally destroyed, and the flames spread to two box cars on a siding, burning them, thence to telegraph poles. When the pole fell all the railroad wires on that division fell, and the interruption of telegraphic service was the first indication the chief train dispatcher of the Southern Pacific had that anything was wrong.

Immediately the company's wire to Chicago was brought into use and by that means Beaumont was reached and a special engine and car were sent out from there with Constable Carpenter of Beaumont on board. When Hancock was the roundhouse box cars and telegraph poles in ashes he continued his journey toward Palm Springs and Beaumont.

The engine then met him and after a short, sharp struggle, Constable Carpenter subdued him, took him aboard, bound hand and foot, and a few minutes later landed him in the Beaumont jail. A conservative estimate of the damage done, furnished by the superintendent of the Los Angeles division today, is \$10,000.

Washington, May 18.—The house elections committee today decided the contest between Wood, Democrat, and Hendry, Republican, from the Twelfth Missouri district (St. Louis), in favor of Hendry. Wood now occupies the seat.

### PRESBYTERIANS FIND A LION IN THE PATH.

Des Moines, Ia., May 18.—The feature of today's session of the Presbyterian general assembly was the unexpected appearance of an obstacle to the union between the assembly in this city and that of the Cumberland Presbyterian church. It came up in connection with a request from the Cumberland assembly, in session at Decatur, Ill., that the Des Moines assembly interpret its action on certain amendments to the original agreement for union so as to upset the plea made by a minority of the Cumberland church in the suit asking for an injunction against the union between the two bodies.

The request brought on a debate, which showed the commissioners to be quite seriously divided in opinion as to the proper interpretation. The plea made by the Cumberland church is that certain amendments were adopted by the Presbyterian church, T. S. A., on judicial commissions which are an addition to the basis of union decided on at Buffalo in 1904.

The assembly today, by a large majority, declared that the amendments, while evidently carried by the presbyteries, had not yet been reported to the assembly or declared a part of the constitution of the church by the assembly, that they were not a part of the constitution and would not be until declared adopted, and are now consequently null and void.

The eight boards of the Presbyterian church report to the assembly a total income for the past year of \$4,498,384, the largest income in the history of the church. One-quarter of this amount was derived from the regular church offerings of the church and about one-tenth of the total income has been received through legacies. The income of the college board for the past year was \$1,604,000. Foreign missions, \$1,145,230; home missions, \$911,734; ministerial relief, \$250,735; freedmen's aid, \$200,042; board of education, \$181,692; church erection, \$118,238; Sunday school work, \$105,502. The church offerings the past year exceeded those of the previous year by \$48,569.

### STAND COLLAPSED

And Five Presbyterian Commissioners Were Injured.

Des Moines, Ia., May 18.—Five commissioners to the Presbyterian general assembly were injured, none seriously, late this afternoon by the collapse of a temporary stand which had been erected for the purpose of getting a large group photograph of the assembly.

### PROF. OSTWALD

Resigns Because of Lack of Support Accorded His Researches.

New York, May 18.—A cable dispatch to the Times from Berlin says Prof. Wilhelm Ostwald has resigned the professorship of chemistry at the University of Leipzig as a result of his displeasure at the lack of support accorded to his chemical researches. He will establish a private laboratory.

Dr. Ostwald lectured at Harvard a few months ago under the arrangement for the exchange of professors between American and German universities.

Apart from his broader work as a scientific philosopher, Dr. Ostwald has made various important chemical discoveries, among them a new process of photographic printing and a method of obtaining nitrogen direct from the air. The latter discovery is of great importance owing to the recent recognition of the possibility of fertilizing the soil by the return to it of the nitrogen, it is constantly imparting to life.

### DAVITT HAS NARROW ESCAPE.

Dublin, May 18.—Michael Davitt, who is now improving, had a narrow escape from death as the result of a complication of blood poisoning and mild form of lockjaw. The trouble commenced with a bad tooth. The inflammation extended to the cheek, necessitating an operation. Blood poisoning was accompanied by a form of lockjaw, the patient's jaw having to be forced open to admit nourishment. For forty-eight hours his life was despaired of when another operation was decided upon, and this time, it is believed, it was successfully performed. Mr. Davitt had not realized his danger until John Dillon happened to call on him and found his condition serious.

### HISTORY OF GREAT FIRE.

San Francisco, May 18.—Each of the citizens of San Francisco who was present during the days of the recent great catastrophe, will be asked to aid in the compilation of the history of that disaster. The history committee prepared a circular, which will be widely distributed. It contains a score or more of questions covering all data desired. In addition each individual addressed will be asked to relate his

personal experience during the trying times. From the mass of material will be gleaned the matter which will be comprised in the authoritative history of the disaster.

### AUSTRALIA FOR THE AUSTRALIANS.

Sydney, N. S. W., May 18.—Alfred Deakin, the federal premier, addressing a great meeting here today, outlined the government's program. Taking the watchword of "Australia for Australians," he cited America, Germany and Japan as examples to follow, where advance was due to the adoption of a national police and a national tariff. He lamented the existence of large numbers of willing agriculturalists who are unable to get land, and said the system of allowing vast tracts of good land to be locked by squatters was a national danger. Mr. Deakin solemnly warned Australians that unless they used their land they would have to step aside for somebody else. At present, he declared, it was only the British flag and fleet that saved Australia from foreign domination.

Among the numerous measures proposed by Mr. Deakin in a wholly protectionist speech he included bills dealing with the land question and monopolies.

### BERTHA DOLBEER'S WILL ADMITTED TO PROBATE.

San Francisco, May 18.—A decision was handed down today by the state supreme court affirming the action of the superior court in admitting to probate the will of the late Bertha Dolbeer. The decision disposes of an estate valued at more than a million dollars, the bulk of which will go to Miss Etta Adrian Warren, who was the young woman's confidante.

Justice Henshaw, who wrote the decision, stated that there was absolutely no evidence to support the theory that Miss Dolbeer was of unsound mind. He pointed out, however, that the court might have given the instruction asked for by the contestants, placing before the jury for determination the question whether Miss Dolbeer was of sound mind or met death by accident. This, however, was not warranted sufficiently grave to warrant a reversal.

Miss Dolbeer was killed about a year and a half ago by the falling of a seventh story window in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York. Her entire estate, which she inherited from her father, John Dolbeer, a lumber merchant, was bequeathed to Miss Warren and a few relatives.

Nothing was left to her relatives, and one of them, Adolph Schandler, an uncle, attempted to break the will, alleging that Miss Dolbeer was of unsound mind when she executed the document.

After a hard legal battle in the superior court a jury upheld the will and the case was carried to the supreme court upon the ground that the lower court had erred in refusing to admit testimony showing that Miss Dolbeer was of unsound mind when she made her will.

### EX-POSTMASTER CROW OF OMAHA ARRESTED.

Omaha, May 18.—Joseph Crow, former postmaster of Omaha and foreman of the postmaster of Omaha and foreman of the recent federal grand jury which returned indictments in the land frauds cases, was today arrested on an indictment by the federal grand jury, charging him with attempting to obstruct justice.

It is charged that Crow tried to bribe the members of the grand jury of which he was foreman to prevent the indictment of Rev. George C. Ware of South Dakota, who was recently convicted of land frauds. Crow was released on \$500 bonds.

### TUG TROUBLES ENDED.

Cleveland, May 18.—An agreement was reached by the representatives of the lake carriers and the Licensed Tugmen's Protective association, which is to hold for two years. This ends all the labor disputes.

### FIRE IN LUMBER YARDS.

Wausau, Wis., May 18.—Fire broke out in the lumber yards of Phillips & Menbner at Marathon City today. Over 3,000,000 feet of lumber, valued at \$50,000, have been consumed and the town is threatened. The woods north of the town are burning fiercely.

### MICHIGAN FACTORY BURNED.

Owosso, Mich., May 18.—The five-story brick furniture factory of the Estey Manufacturing company, known among the company's buildings as factory A, was burned tonight. Loss, \$100,000. The Lake Ice company's ice houses are also in ruins.
