WEBER COUNTY BUSINESS.

Lively Meeting of the City Council - Expensive Legal Light.

County Assessor Will Tax All Unused Church and School Property - Horse and Buggy Stolen.

Assessor J. W. Gibson appeared before the county commissioners yesterday and asked the board to purchase for his office a new metallic book truck for the new assessment rolls. The matter was referred to the committee on supplies.

A communication was received from Adam Peterson, of Huntsville, calling the attention of the board to the dangerous blasting of rock in Ogden canyon. On motion of Commissioner Wilson the matter was referred to Sheriff Layne with instructions to arrest any person found guilty of such carelessness and also for the county attorney to prosecute any such person arrested for committing such nuisance by endangering the safety of persons traveling the canyon.

County Treasurer Chambers notified the board that he had appointed Wallace Foulger as a deputy in his office. The appointment was confirmed.

Bishop David McKay, health officer of Huntsville, Eden and Liberty, appeared and requested the board to accept his resignation. On motion of Commissioner Sken the resignation was accepted and on his motion C. C. Wengard of Huntsville was appointed his successor.

Commissioner Wilson reported the abutments of the new bridge at the mouth of Ogden canyon completed and that he had employed J. W. Plignon to build retaining wall leading to abutments at \$25 per yard.

Commissioner Stanford reported that a claim will be presented by Weber county against the estate of Mrs. Sarah Martin, deceased, for \$244.50, the amount paid by Weber county to Mrs. Martin, who was a charge on Weber county during her life time. An itemized statement for the amount due for clothing, coal, groceries, etc., was referred to the county attorney to present to the administrator of the estate and collect.

Commissioner Stanford reported that he had received a letter from a taxpayer protesting against the county rendering any further assistance to Louis Miller and he recommended that no further assistance be allowed. The report was adopted.

The matter of arranging for the publishing of delinquent tax list for 1901 was referred to Commissioner Stanford. A communication was received from C. Gourley calling the attention of the board to the fact that they had not placed a headstone at the grave of the deceased soldier McCormick as provided by law. The board authorized the erection of a stone at his grave not to exceed \$30 in cost.

The committee on taxes reported with reference to the request of W. E. Maeson, that no taxes should be charged on the property situated on the corner of Grant avenue and Twenty-fourth streets known as the school of the Good Shepherd, which was this year assessed at \$5,632, and the taxes amounted to \$168.47. The committee reported that the property up to 1901 had not been taxed, but that a part of the land was not occupied by the school building and therefore the assessor thought it should be assessable; and in the county attorney's opinion the assessment was proper and legal, therefore, the committee was of the opinion that the request should not be granted, and the report was adopted. A legal point of considerable importance is connected with this tax matter, in that

the law provides that all property used for church and school purposes shall be exempt from taxation and as this tract of land which is assessed, is used for grounds to the school building, it being 140x155 feet, it was the opinion of the church people that it should not be taxed but County Attorney Halverson gave as his opinion that the land was not used for the school and should therefore be taxed, and it was on his opinion the board based their decision denying the request. It is understood that County Assessor Gibson intends in the future assessing all such lands in the Weber county that is owned by churches or school boards, and is not occupied by any buildings or used for such purposes, and where a large piece of land is owned by a church or similar organization and part of the land is used for church or school buildings, so much of the land as is occupied by such buildings will not be taxed, but the remaining portion of the piece of land will be taxed.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

At the session of the city council last night the itemized bills of the special counsel in the waterworks litigation created considerable surprise. These bills were presented in accordance with the request made by the council at a previous session. That of H. H. Henderson was for \$2,251.50. That of Ogden Hills was for nine days at \$50 a day, or \$450.

The communication from the mayor stating that the estray ordinance could not, in his judgment, be legally published in the Salt Lake papers, was referred to the committee on legal light. The mayor suggested that there were any paper published in Ogden which would do the work as cheap, he would favor the publication in such a journal. The ordinance was ordered published in the Standard.

The motion to advertise for bids for paving Washington avenue was defeated by a vote of five ayes and four noes. A two-thirds vote is required to appropriate money.

The ordinance repealing an ordinance was again repealed in order to correct some technical defects in the former repeal ordinance.

Brown introduced an ordinance taxing liquor stores \$25 per month for retailing liquor. It passed its first reading.

The mayor sent in a communication reporting in detail his expenditures from the contingent fund and stating that he had several times asked to get this account audited by the council, but without success. He now asked that it be given immediate attention. After considerable discussion and after the council had appointed an auditing committee heretofore appointed were discharged and the business turned over to a new committee with the president of the council as chairman. The committee will name the other two members later.

HORSE AND BUGGY STOLEN.

John Manning of Hooper reported to the sheriff's office that he had his horse and buggy stolen from the rear of his home on Broadway street. The horse is a light brown mare, weighing 1,000 pounds, brand D left thigh; single top buggy, center spring.

Bischoff vs Ogden Steam Laundry; suit brought for damages for personal injury. The action was dismissed on motion of plaintiff, the case having been settled out of court.

The case of Stuart vs Stokes was set for hearing Dec. 12.

The case of Conroy vs A. C. McKenney, action brought by plaintiff to recover \$5,000 alleged to be due on breach of contract, the defendant having failed to deliver a certain number of cases of tomatoes which they had contracted to deliver to plaintiff. The following jury was impaneled to hear the case: Robert Todd, R. T. Harris, Mark Wenzel, Ole Olson, Martin McFarland, Wm. Sewell, P. A. Nelsbitt and A. J. Heath. The plaintiff is represented by W. L. Maglioni, and the defense by T. D. Johnson. It is expected that the hearing of the case will occupy several days.

Mrs. Florence Stanford was granted a decree of divorce from her husband, George Y. Stanford, on the grounds of intemperance. The defendant permitted the case to go by default. Mrs. Stanford was also given custody of her now child by the decree and \$25 per month alimony, also \$75 attorney's fees and costs of court. The couple were married in Ogden March 13, 1900.
