

MARCH OF THE DOUKHOBORS.

They Are Unloaded From the Cars At Yorkton.

GIVEN AN ALTERNATIVE.

Can Ride If They Choose or They May Walk, but They Must Go—The Start.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 10.—The Doukhobors belonging to the Wan river district were unloaded from the cars this morning at Yorkton and another chapter in their pilgrimage was begun. At an early hour Inspector Pedley, Agent Speers and an interpreter went through the train and told the Russians that they would be started for home; that wagons would be provided and that they might ride if they chose, but if they did not they would be compelled to march on foot. A number of policemen were lined up and the Doukhobors followed their leaders from the train. Everything went smoothly for the first quarter of a mile, when a halt was made, and several of the leaders were loaded in the wagons much against their will. The procession started very slowly and difficulty was experienced in keeping the marchers from turning back. They seemed to be in a rebellious mood, and it is believed that much difficulty will be experienced before they are landed upon their farms. They had reached a point 12 miles north of Yorkton tonight, and their villages are expected to be reached tomorrow night. Before departing for the north Agent Speers said: "If they resist on the homeward journey we will use force, as we did at Minnedosa, and drive them to the north. We realize now that we must treat these people as children, and make them obey." Speers attributes the trouble largely to the leaders, whom he believes to be very shrewd.

"Some time ago," he said, "the government warned the Doukhobors that if they did not homestead their farms in the northwest, they would be thrown out of settlement. The leaders objected to this and asked for concessions. Fearing that they would not get them, they have been attempting to force the hands of the government by inducing their easily led countrymen to make a pilgrimage, under a pretense of looking for Jesus. Their movements have been vague and indefinite, but just the same there has been method in the madness of their leaders."

"In doing as I did at Minnedosa, it was largely upon my own authority. The situation demanded immediate action. Had 500 half-starved Russians started out on their tramp across the prairie, in the face of the blizzard that was raging, the morning would have revealed a terrible story. I have no hesitation in saying that I believe scores of them would have been frozen corpses. They were bent on self-destruction, and it was necessary to control their journey and our action in preventing them surely cannot be criticized."

To Encourage Canadian Immigration.
London, Nov. 10.—The Canadian immigration office in London which was recently promoted to the dignity of a special bureau with a commissioner of its own, is preparing to branch out on an active scale with a view of popularizing immigration to the northwest. Two floors have been secured in a new building, near Charing Cross, in the midst of the railroad and steamship offices and are being fitted up for office.

Commissioner Preston said to a representative of the Associated Press: "We expect next year to place 100,000 emigrants in western Canada and we shall probably draw a third of them from the United States, United Kingdom and the rest from Europe."

Teachers-Labor Union Affiliation.
Chicago, Nov. 11.—As a result of the vote in favor of the affiliation of the Chicago Teachers' federation with the federation of labor, the former organization is threatened with dissolution. Miss Ella A. Rowe has resigned as president, asserting as the cause her disapproval of the action of the teachers.

A LOVE TRAGEDY.
A woman slays a man to death in Lombard Street, London.

New York, Nov. 11.—A sensational love tragedy has been enacted in this city in full view of hundreds of people, cables the London correspondent of the Herald.

The young woman named Kitty Byron stabbed to death her lover, Arthur Reginald Baker, a well-known member of the stock exchange. Before the woman could move she was seized by several witnesses of the deed and given into custody.

The crime which had every element of sensationalism, took place just outside the Lombard street postoffice. Although the city was generally making merry over the lord mayor's procession there was the usual press of business at this eventful office.

Scores of men and boys were passing the spot every few moments. Shortly after 2 o'clock a young woman of attractive appearance with slight figure,

dark eyebrows, black hair and handsome features, went into the postoffice and sent an express letter to the stock exchange. She waited a few minutes, when she was joined by Mr. Baker, to whom the letter had been addressed.

For several minutes the couple engaged in conversation near the counter. Then their voices rose, and the clerk noticed that they were quarreling.

Finally the man turned toward the street with a gesture intimating that he wished to end the interview. He passed through the door. The woman followed, curiously handling her muff, and dealt the man a terrific blow in the neck.

As he half staggered and then partially turned around, with one foot on the lower step, the woman withdrew the weapon and struck again, this time plunging it into his left breast.

The man gasped and fell heavily forward, his head striking the stone pavement. Two clerks seized the woman who was leaning over the prostrate form as though preparing to strike a third blow.

Mr. Baker died on the way to the hospital. The young woman was taken to the police court, where she gave her name as Kitty Byron, aged 23, but refused to say anything further.

Baker's wife recently instituted divorce proceedings.

ANNEXATION OF CANADA.

Archbishop Ireland Believes It Will Surely Come.

New York, Nov. 11.—In speaking at the banquet of the Minnesota society in this city Archbishop Ireland expressed the belief that Canada eventually will be under the domination of the United States. The transition, he said, would come without conquest, without war.

After telling of the growth of America in comparison with other great nations, the archbishop said: "Within a few years the commerce of the states on the Pacific coast will equal that of those on the Atlantic. The development of the lands to the east, west, the north and the south is going on more rapidly and safely than ever before and we are reaping and will continue to reap benefits. From the east the movement will be westward to that section, and from the west-eastward to the same destination."

"I do not want to be boresome, but I say this for myself; as far as fate, all things you and I may not see it, the starry banner will wave mistress over all the territory from the gulf to the bay. There will be no conquest, no war. The hands that the border are already beating with love for us, their commerce and agriculture are calling for espousals."

Reason for the Increase of the power of the United States. The archbishop found in the universal liberty enjoyed by the citizens. He said that he had the greatest confidence in the prosperity of America as the home of human liberty and what America needs to insure this is conscientiousness of one's own rights, which should be demanded and sustained, and, secondly, a respect for the rights of others, and an inclination to help them to widen every possibility.

Christian Home for Honolulu Japs. San Francisco, Nov. 11.—Members of the Methodist Episcopal church in this city interested in oriental mission work have decided to establish a Japanese Christian home in Honolulu. The Japanese women working in the island rice fields are said to be particularly anxious to have the home established and are willing to contribute to the cause. The institution will be known as the Susanna Wesley home.

French Industrial School for Chicago. Chicago, Nov. 11.—Mrs. Carter H. Harrison, wife of the mayor, has become the recipient of a decoration at the hands of Henri Merou, the French consul, for her work in advancing the interests of the Alliance Francaise. On behalf of the latter Mr. Merou presented her with a handsome gold medal suspended from a clasp in the form of a rosette. The medal is the insignia of an officer of public instruction and is a French order highly prized among educators.

STRUGGLE WITH A MADMAN. He Suddenly Attacks the Surgeon in an Ambulance.

New York, Nov. 11.—A terrible struggle in which Dr. Hyde of Bellevue hospital was seriously injured has occurred in an ambulance while the vehicle was being driven rapidly through the streets of this city.

The ambulance had picked up an almost unconscious man at Union market, and started to the hospital. Dr. Hyde, who was sitting in the front seat, suddenly leaped to his feet and, with a scream, fell upon the doctor. The driver, fearing for the rescue, headed toward a police station, lashing his team into a wild run.

Arriving there, it required the combined efforts of four men to unloose the hold of the mad man upon the unfortunate surgeon. The latter's injuries were found to be serious but not fatal.

ARIZONA PRISONERS ESCAPE.

Forty Overpowered the Guard in Broad Daylight.

Tucson, Ariz., Nov. 11.—Forty prisoners escaped from the jail at Cananea when overpowered the jailers and escaped in broad daylight. The men were charged with different offenses ranging from petty larceny to murder.

This is the second jail delivery in a month and a new prison is being cut out of the side of the mountain where escape will be well nigh an impossibility.

BOLIVIA IN A STATE OF SIEGE.

New York, Nov. 11.—Citizens of this city were astonished Saturday evening, says a Herald dispatch from La Paz, Bolivia, via Taona, Chili, when government officials posted throughout the republic placards which declared the whole republic of Bolivia in a state of siege owing to the country being threatened.

The decree caused intense excitement because of the unexpectedness of the announcement and ignorance of the reason for the government adopting such a step.

El Comercio, in commenting on the situation, says: "The exact seriousness of the news from Acre is unknown, but the government must be in possession of grave news to take such measures and to declare a state of siege which appears unnecessary, as the entire country, without distinction of party or class, will stand by the government."

"Some persons attribute the government's action to a desire to obtain popularity and to put an end to the senate's opposition to concluding arrangements with Chili."

"These changes we regard as unfounded and we recommend that the

government make public all news from Acre immediately after being received." Col. Rojas, to whom reference is made in the official dispatches to the Bolivian government was the commander of the Bolivian forces in Acre.

UNIVERSITY OF PARIS. Will Accept Offer of Scholarships For French Students in America.

New York, Nov. 11.—The council of the University of Paris has accepted Robert Le Baudy's recent offer to endow scholarships for French students of American universities, according to a Times dispatch from that city by way of London.

Pretender Attacks Moroccan Army.

New York, Nov. 11.—The pretender to the throne, with a large following, attacked the Moroccan army at "day-break on Nov. 3," says a dispatch from Fez to the Times by way of London. The invaders penetrated the camp, but

the sultan's troops rallied and drove off the rebels, whom they pursued, inflicting much loss.

The pretender, with some of his followers, took refuge in a native castle, which the troops attacked, captured and burned on Nov. 4. Many rebels were killed or taken prisoners, but the pretender escaped.

The pretender's former followers are now said to be searching for him. His prestige is alleged to have vanished as he promised miraculous intervention and the complete annihilation of the sultan's troops.

Tore Open His Wounds and Died.

Chicago, Nov. 11.—Tearing open the wounds which he had inflicted a few hours before with suicidal intent, Detective Edward Niland, of the South Englewood police station, died last night at the Englewood Union hospital, killed on Nov. 4. Many rebels were killed or taken prisoners, but the pretender escaped.

English Suspicious of Kaiser's Visit.

New York, Nov. 11.—The English press continues to regard the German emperor's visit with suspicion and distrust, cables the London correspondent of the Tribune. He is not lampooned or caricatured, but it is generally assumed that he is here for business purposes, and that he must not be allowed to have what he wants. The conjectures respecting his mission differ widely.

French at the Hague.

Will Not be Adopted as Official Language.

Brussels, Nov. 11.—It is asserted here that, owing to the opposition of Germany, Great Britain, the United States and other powers, the proposal which has been advanced to make French the official language of the international arbitration court at The Hague will be withdrawn.

He proposed a reduction of the land tax and of the interest on southern land mortgages, and reintroduction of perpetual leaseholds of small holdings at low rent, in order to break up the huge uncultivated estates and urged reform of agricultural labor contracts in favor of the peasants.
