THE SUICIDE AT PANAMA.

Full Details Published as to the Death Act.

[Correspondence of the DESERET NEWS.]—There are so many versions of the suicide of William H. Davison, that, on the night of the 22nd instant, the benefit of his claim relatives and friends I desire to make a current statement through the News. The deceased has been in a single bed since the 10th May last. He left the 16th November, 1890, to Cleve Valley, to work for parties there, among others. On the evening of the 25th he returned quite unexpectedly. To my inquiry as to the cause, he replied that he was "very sick boy" and began to cry. I told him to close up and I would give him some medicine, and that a good night rest would put him all right. He complained of a cold and a severe pain in the head. I treated him to the best of my ability, using hot foot baths, mustard plasters, a heavy cathartic, etc., and put him in a warm bed, with more wraps around him. He was extremely nervous and restless, and seemed afraid of left him. He was unable to sleep, and when he did, had not his rest was better.
