The game has become open and free without cestroying its points of interest. These conditions are significant and to those who detect a waning interest in baseball there comes the suggestion that football is perhaps developing too much of national interest. "If this be so, it is regrettable; but it must be confessed that American people from the president down have been edu-cated, perhaps stimulated, into an en-thusiasm for grand national courage and sports of the rational type."
