BALVINS AS "D'ARTAGNAN."

Salvioli as the hero in the dramatization of Dumas' "Tres Gardeurs," scenes similar ground to that on which we found him the night before as "Don Quixote de la Mancha." The characters are somewhat similar; the former is the better balanced and more dramatic of the two, but the man who can play either well, can portray the other just as well, or nearly so.

There is not so much chance for him to be as strong in "D'Artagnan" as in "Don Quixote," and the author therefore gave us less, but still as before, a little more than the critics or the drama call for. It is also given an excellent performance.

It is calculated to work up the enthusiasm of the audience, support, however, was steady and indifferent in places, but very fair considering it's what.
