Proposed Revision of Tariff Laws.

Bosron, 6.—At a meeting of the Board of Trade to-day, it was un-animously resolved to appoint a apecial committee to represent the Board before the Secretary of the Treasury and the committee of the Senate and House of Repre-sentatives concerning a revision of the tariff laws, with the view to simplify collections of customs rev-enue, remove obstructions to comthe matter.
