I believe that if we do not use and improve upon the talents God has given us, we shall not be able to progress. I am afraid too many of us think we have sufficient testimony and knowledge of the Gospel. But I fear that a man who does not add to his knowledge of spiritual things will come under condemnation.

I have often noted the ready responses made by our Elders who are called upon missions, and if we were as ready to show obedience and make sacrifices in other directions as we are in this, we would be far more united as a people than we are.

Many of these Elders who are so ready to sacrifice years of their time to go on missions are not willing, on their return, to make even a small sacrifice in the performance of duties at home. In a short time after their return they seem to lay off the harness entirely. But if it is our desire to press on-

ward and become strong intellectually and spiritually, we must continue ready and willing to make sacrifices in the discharge of the duties required of us. There is need for all of us to labor to the full ex-tent of the powers that have been given to us, to forward the work of God on the earth.

Almost all of the Elders of this

Church have received a testimony of the truth of this work and are able to bear testimony that they are engaged in the work of God. feel a life and a power in it greater than this world could impart to it. We as Elders of Israel know that we are engaged in the work of God, but do we labor faithfully and consistently? Do we so live as to conform our course to the Gospel we offer to the nations? I believe it is the duty of every man who has embraced this work to so order his life that no honest man can find any fault with it. It is necessary for us to lead lives that are consistent with our professions, and if we fail to do this it will be hard to inspire our own children with faith in the doctrines we preach.

When an individual has received light and intelligence from God, and then neglects to carry out the counsel and advice of the Scrptures, the loss to that individual will be greater than to one who had not received such light and knowledge. The sooner we awaken to the fact that we must depend upon ourselves to work out our own salvation, the sooner we will arouse to greater efforts.

that the liberties of the Latter-day Saints would be taken from them. Today not a vestige of political liberty remains to the Latter-day Saints in Idaho, unless it can be called such to be permitted to pay taxes and to die. These two privileges still remain to them. A religious test oath has been established under which a man can't leave the "Mormon" Church under two years, and then he must have a Gentile swear for him that he is really out. It is provided in the Constitution that no that no religious test can ever be established under our government, but this has been done in Idaho. also provided in the Constitution that no expost facto law shall be passed; but this also has been done. All this is in fulfilment of prophecy. It is now proposed to prevent Latter-day Saints from acquiring title to lands under the laws of Congress, and it seems to be a widespread feeling that this people have no rights which ought to be respected.

The speaker referred to the recent dedication of the Latter-day Saints' Seminary in the Eighteenth Ward, and dwelt at some length upon the necessity of laying a religious and spiritual foundation for the education imparted to our children.

If our Elders were as zealous in providing schoolhouses wherein their children could be properly educated, as they are in going on missions to the nations, it would be inestimable blessing to our childreu. Unless we do hetter means of religious instruction for the rising generation, I fear that many of them will turn away from the truth.

I have seen men who, in the days of their poverty, were humble and obedient to the requirements of the Gospel, but I have seen them change when they became wealthy. We ought to increase and grow spiritually when God blesses us tempor-

He was a Prophet inspired of God, and that is the reason why every principle he revealed was the truth; that is why he did that which the learning of man could not accomplish. He came with "Thus said the Lord," and the power and authority of Jehovah were with him. Who of all the denominations knew any-thing of baptism for the dead, or of temples till he revealed it? None. Who knew of the gathering of Israel and how it should be done till he came? None. Yet this so-called impostor brought forth more truth than the world possessed, and therefore there could be no imposition. He was in every respect what he claimed to be, and when the Gospel message which he taught was received the testimony of the Holy Ghost followed, and the Lord bore witness to its truth.

When I received the Gospel this was my experience. The spirit of the gathering came upon me, and I was desirous of assembling with the Church of God; and I had no rest till I gathered. This is the case with the Saints in every land, and This is the case is a fulfillment of prophecies made by Prophets anciently.
