## WEATHER REPORT.

Memorial Exercises in St. Mark's Cathedral—Tributes to Worth Of Departed Episcopal Prelate.

## OFFICIAL ACTION WAS TAKEN.

Elks' Memorial Services—Rev. Fish Preaches Sermon Against Capital Punishment—Other Addresses.

Following the funeral Saturday of Bishop Leonard, came the memorial service yesterday morning in St. Mark's cathedral, where tributes were paid to the late prelate's worth by Bishops D. S. Tuttle of Missouri, Bishop Olmstead of Colorado, Bishop Moreland of Sacramento, and Bishop Punton of Idaho. The music was very choice, and the church was crowded beyond the doors. The following official action was taken yesterday, on Bishop Leonard's death:

"The bishops present at the burial of our Reverend Father in God, Bishop Leonard, D. S. Tuttle, with the clergy and the faithful of the Methodist District of Colorado, record our sense of loss and bereavement in his early departure from among us, our sympathy with his wife and children in their sore affliction and our thankfulness to Almighty God for the pious example of His servants' life and ministry."

"We have all known something of his trials and cares, his weary journeys and hard work, but we have been unable to fathom the sum of them. He was a rare fidelity to duty, a patient endurance of the many perplexities of his work, an abounding zeal for the building up of Christ's spiritual kingdom in our western land. For more than 15 years he quietly labored here, giving his whole mind and heart to the sacred cause to which he had been consecrated, spending his life and strength for the church he loved and adored."

"What joy and felicity must be his in the fold of peace where now he rests and waits for the brighter ages yet to come! How glad must he be in the company of the blessed and holy dead, who look for the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting in heaven."

"May God strengthen him in His Spirit, for we have here until we also are joined to that sinless realm where God's children grow white and strong in the light and glory of His smile, and grant that we with our departed father and all the blessed saints, may be kept through His power unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time, and may rise to the life immortal through Him that loves us so well."

"In His name and in the name of His Son, Jesus Christ, we pray unto God, who made us kings and priests unto God, His Father, to whom be glory and dominion both now and forever. Amen."

ELKS' MEMORIAL SERVICES.

CAITAL PUNISHMENT.

Rev. W. H. Fish preached in the Unitarian church yesterday against capital punishment, taking as his text, "Love your enemies." He said: Two arguments are advanced in favor of the death penalty: first, the severity of the second argument, if we ought to hang murderers because Moses so ordered, we ought for the same reason to hang blasphemers and Sabbath breakers. It is a relic of barbarism, and ought to be abolished in the interests of humanity. Moreover, capital punishment is not a deterrent to crime. Where the penalty is death, it is practically impossible to secure a conviction; as the jurors do not like to shoulder the responsibility. Consequently more criminals are turned out in society than if there were no such law; and more murderers are being lynched than legally hung, right in the United States, than are being hanged by the state.

EAST SIDE BAPTIST.

Rev. Dr. Henry C. Mable of Boston preached yesterday morning in the East Side Baptist church on the announcement of the Savior in Matthew that all authority on heaven and on earth had been given to him. He exhorted the command for the disciples to go forth and preach the gospel to every creature. Dr. Mable made a special point that if Christ had not been able to make this statement, He and His followers would never have been able to score a single convert.
