Granting unto Brigham Young, sen., and Franklin D. Richards the control of waters from Mill Creek in Salt Lake County.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah, That all the rights and privileges as contemplated in "An act granting the control of waters from Mill Creek in Great Salt Lake county unto Willard Richards," approved Feb. 3, 1852, be, and hereby are granted unto Brigham Young, sen., and Franklin D. Richards.

AN ACT

To amend "An act granting to Isaac Bullock and Lewis Robinson the right to erect ferries across Green River, and control the same."

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah, That "An act granting to Isaac Bullock and Lewis Robinson, the right to erect ferries across Green river and control the same," approved Dec. 27, 1855, is hereby amended by striking out the words "Provided that nothing herein shall justify the parties in taking more than one third over the within specified rates of toll," in the fifth, sixth and seventh lines of section third, in said act.

AN ACT

Appropriating money for a Territorial road in Juab County.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah, That the sum of three hundred dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the county court of Juab county, in repairing the territorial road in Salt Creek canyon in said county.

Sec. 2. When this appropriation is expended and the work accepted by the Territorial Road Commissioner, he shall give a certificate to each undertaker, certifying the amount he is entitled to, which certificate shall be a voucher for the Auditor of Public Accounts to draw a warrant on the treasury for the amount.
