Local and Other Matters.

Third District Court.—The time of the Third District Court was occupied this morning with the case of John Tiersan vs. Nicholas Treweek. This is a mining case, the bone of contention being the St. John's mine, Bingham. It is likely to be a protracted hearing.

The 11th Ward Robbery.—One of the parties arrested for participation in the 11th Ward Co-operative store robbery, recently perpetrated, had a hearing before Justice Pyper this morning, and was unconditionally discharged, the evidence pointing in any other direction than that of his guilt.

Henry the Fifth.—The drama of "Henry the Fifth" was presented last night to a large house in even better style than on Monday night. The two tableaux of the Battle of Agincourt were very effective, and a decided improvement. Mr. Rigold was King Henry to perfection, and he was supported with much credit by the company.

Stage for Toquerville.—Gilmor & Salway are now making arrangements to change the route of their Salt Lake stage line, so that it will run direct from Piche to Toquerville, thence to Salt Lake City, returning the same way. The alteration will be made very shortly to accommodate the increased travel to that place.—*Pioche Record*.

Home Manufacture.—Mr. James, tinner and iron plate worker, of this city, has been the first to successfully galvanize iron for home consumption. A specimen deposited at the Deseret Museum some months ago has been seen by competent judges and pronounced equal to Eastern work. It appears that Mr. Charles F. Williams, who is in the employ of Mr. James, is the practical operator in this department of industry, and his success enables it to be recorded as another addition to our home manufactures.

The Coal Question.—The supply of coal on sale in this city fluctuates constantly and seems to increase very slowly, if at all. It seems almost preposterous that with a bare chain of mountains separating us from what will yet, probably, prove to be one of the greatest coal deposits in America, and with all kinds of facilities for transporting it the few intervening miles, there should ever be a deficiency in the market; yet this condition is more frequent than any other, and those who wish to purchase, on finding that there is none on sale, can only say, "Why is it?"

The European Mission.—The following is from the *Millennial Star* of Nov. 6.—"Nottingham, Oct. 23.—Since the departure of Brother Farrell last June, we have held camp meetings at Codnor, Greasley, Watton, Shepperton, and Whitwick, and have done considerable out-door preaching in many of the towns and villages in this Conference, and have as a general thing been favored with respectable congregations and good order.

"In this town we have held meetings regularly in the old market square, and have had congregations numbering from 200 to 500, and invariably good order, and many have appeared to take a great interest in the principles of the Gospel. I held a camp meeting at St. Andrew's, in Northamptonshire, in company with Elders John Robinson and J. T. Beilston, of the Birmingham Conference, which has a small Branch of wide-awake Saints at that place, and we had good congregations to listen to us. At this place and Offord Darcy, where Brother Farrell held a camp meeting last June, there are good prospects for spreading out and breaking new ground, as the Gospel has not been preached in that neighborhood for years, and is very lately, and the Saints here are mostly new members and are full of zeal for the kingdom of God."

Supposed Killed by Lightning.—Our Kanab correspondent, W. D. Johnson, Jr., writes from that place, under date of the 15th inst.—

"On the 11th inst., a sad affair occurred at Upper Kanab, 18 miles north of this place—the sudden and unexpected death of a young man, named John McColough, a resident of St. George, who was and still is a former place helping to move the dairy of the Canaan Co-op. herd to St. George.

"About an hour before dark he went to the creek, to water his mules, and was seen returning with them a short time after. After dark some of the rancho hands brought in a herd of cattle, when they came to a certain spot in the road the stock belowed and shied off, quite frightened. On looking to see the cause of their alarm they found the body of young McColough, lying in the road and the lightning, and it is supposed that he was struck by the electric fluid.

"He was a very healthy, robust young man of 19 years, and was well respected by all who knew him. His parents are both dead. He leaves a number of brothers and sisters. His friends took the corpse to St. George, for interment.

"Our quiet little town, for the last week, has been quite lively and business-like, as our trustees have some twenty men at work on the new school-house. The building is going up rapidly.

"Our weather is still lovely."

Indian Campaigning.—In conversation to-day with Lieut. Taylor, formerly stationed at Fort Cameron, Beaver, but recently removed to Nebraska, we were informed of some of the hardships pertaining to an Indian campaign in the Black Hills, from which we infer that such an expedition is anything but a pleasure excursion. As a natural consequence, in a wild, desolate country like the Hills and contiguous territory, where supplies cannot be obtained upon any terms, and where transportation is always difficult and sometimes impracticable, the entire annihilation of commissary stores is a question of a very short time—so it was in the case of a recent expedition in which the Lieutenant was engaged. The rations finally consisted of two hard biscuits and such horseflesh *per diem* as could be picked up, and it was generally regarded as a luxury. When, on regaining the outskirts of civilization, and being compelled to pay one dollar for indifferent meals, the command doubtless experienced in relation to the Indians a feeling similar to that which was entertained by the hunter who was solicited to go bear hunting—that they had not lost any. The Lieutenant will return to Nebraska in a few days, subject to future orders from the Department, but leaves his family here.

New York Semi-Annual Conference.—The Semi-Annual Conference of the New York Conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was held October 28th, 1876, at American Hall, 178 Grand Street, Williamsburg, L. I., Elder W. C. Staines presiding.

Morning, 11:30 o'clock.

On the stand were Elders Rudger Clawson, of Salt Lake City, Blaine, of New Canaan, Conn., Bywater and Pauline of Williamsburg, Miller and Garret of Hoboken.

After the meeting was opened, Elder Butler dwelt with great stress upon repentance, remission of sins, the gift of the Holy Ghost, testimony, blessings and covenants, impressing upon us the solemnity of living nearer to our God every day.

Elder W. C. Staines said he thought that it was the smallest conference he had ever seen, and hoped that he would not lack in spirit what we needed in numbers. He cautioned the Saints upon rendering obedience to the counsel given us by the priesthood. He spoke very earnestly upon gathering to Zion, speaking very strongly to those who could go but would not.

President Bywater stated that all who were present would profit by the salutary advice given.

At the close of the conference, 2 o'clock.

President Staines requested the secretary of the Conference to pre-

sent the reports of the several branches, which were immediately offered and accepted.

President Staines presented the Authorities of the Church, as published in the News, which were unanimously accepted.

Elder Stonespoke at some length upon the duties of the latter-day Saints in building up the kingdom of God, not only by their prayers, but by their means, their talents, and their lives.

Elder R. Clawson dwelt upon the foundation of our religion, Elder French upon the celestial glory, Elder Pullan upon emigration, Elder Miller upon the renewal of life, President Bywater upon unity and love, and Elder Staines upon the Order of the Church.

President Bywater moved that we adjourn our conference till this day six months. Carried.

The conference held this year, although attended by but very few, was in point of spirit the best held here for years, and all seemed to partake of an uncommon feeling of buoyancy.
