Wilson was present and urged upon the commissioners the great necessity of the con-solidation so that the districts may be more equally benefitted from the tax-ation of corporations. Hon. Archi-bald McFarland and J. B. Carver were ilso present and heartily supported he consolidation. Ammon Green and several others opposed the recommendation.

Commissioner Stanford moved that the following districts be consolidated into school district No. 1: Hooper, Roy, Kanesville, Taylor, West Weber, Wil-son and Garland; and the following districts into district No. 2. Plain City, Warren, Fase West and Poplar. He rave as his reason for supporting the measure that he believed it would be for the best good of the various pre-cincts to be consolidated into one, and

The tent caterpillar is again terribly in evidence in Cache valley. They swarm in untold numbers on the pop-lar, balm of Gilead and fruit trees, stripping the leaves clean. The worms are the bane of the orchardists, who are making stremuous efforts to destroy them by spraying, but the caterpillars seem to yet have the upper hand. tive city offices. Ordinarily the mayor is vested with power to fill such vacan-cies, and he possessed that power un-der Sec. 214°R. S. But our Legislature at its session of 1899 on page 121 amended this section of the statutes and specifically limited the power of the movies in his appointments to full-Richmond, G. W. Skidmore, principal the mayor, in his appointments, to fill-ing vacancies occurring in appointive city offices. This being a direct and specific limitation, in my opinion, con-fines the mayor's power of filling va-cancies to such offices as are specified in the law. Now as to who has the power to fill vacancies occurring in elective offices: At common law the power of appointing officers is to be power of appointing officers is to be exercised by the municipal corporation at large, and not by any select body, unless it is so provided in the charter. Our laws and your charter authorize the common council to fill vacancies occurring in its membership by electing some suitable person to fill the vacan-cy, should one occur, section 197 R. S. Now while there is no direct power vested in the council to fill vacancies vested in the council to fill vacancies occurring in elective offices, yet by analogy and under the rules of the common law and the necessity for the

welfare of the municipality to have all its city offices filled it need not be directly conferred by charter, but the power is incidental to the general duties of the council to fill all vacancies occurring in any city office, where the power to fill such vacancy has not been specifically vested somewhere else.

Councilman Taylor reported that the committee on waterworks was now in vestigating the matter of connecting the waterworks system with the springs in Provo canyon, and would report its findings as to the most feasible route, etc., at an early meeting. Two ordinances were passed: The bi-cycle ordinance, and an ordinance pro-viding for the reincorporation in the city limits of territory south of the city.
