CONSOLIDATED COUNTY SCHOOLS.

The proposition to consolidate several of the county school districts as recommended by Superintendent Wilson, and approved by a large majority of the citizens interested, was favorably acted upon by the board of county commissioners at its regular session yesterday. Hon. Archibald McFarland and J. B. Carver were present and urged upon the commissioners the great necessity of the consolidation so that the districts may be more equitably benefited from the taxation of corporations. Hon. Commissioner Stanford moved that the following districts be consolidated into school district No. 1: Hooper, Roy, Kanabville, Taylor, West Weber, Wilson, and Garland; and the following districts into district No. 2: Plain City, Warren, Park West and Poplar. He gave as his reason for supporting the measure that he believed it would be for the best good of the various districts to be consolidated into one, and that the people of those districts want it, as was shown by the recent election on the proposition, it having carried by a large majority.

Commissioner Stanford supported Mr. Stanford's motion and Commissioner Wilson voted against it, but the majority being for it, it was declared by the chairman to have passed, and in the future taxes will be levied on the districts in that part of the county there will only be two. They will hold an election in the very near future for trustees.

Frederic Foy and Dr. U. V. Withers appeared before the board in behalf of the opening of a county road in the Garland district to Little Mountain. The necessary land is to be given to the county, if they will fence the road. The matter was referred to Commissioner Foyers to investigate and report.

A number of minor matters were disposed of and adjournment taken for one week.

TENT CATERPILLAR PEST.

When a tree is cleaned off they migrate to a neighboring tree, passing in a long endline over houses, trees or what not in a black, moving mass. The worms are the bane of the orchardists, who are making strenuous efforts to destroy them by spraying, but the caterpillars seem yet have the upper hand. SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL.

City Marshal Muddle Still Demanding Attention of Solons.

Special Correspondence.

Provo, Utah Co., June 2.—The matter of the city marshal muddle came up again in the city council last evening.

Late yesterday afternoon Myron C. Newell, the appointee of the mayor, filed his official bond, approved by the mayor, with the recorder, who presented it to the council. He was instructed to send it to the mayor with the statement that there is no vacancy in the office of city marshal.

Councilman Taylor read the following letter from Attorney-General Breiden bearing on the subject:

"Referring to our personal interview on June 1, I desire to state, that our statutes are silent on the subject of filling vacancies occurring in elective city offices. Ordinarily the mayor is vested with power to fill such vacancies, and he possessed the power to do so in the case of the city marshal.

At its session of 1899 on page 121 amended this section of the statutes and specifically limited the power of the mayor, in his appointing power, to fill vacancies occurring in appointive city offices. This being a direct and specific limitation, in my opinion, confines the mayor's power of filling vacancies to such offices as are specified in the law. Now, if we will consider the power of appointing officers is to be exercised by the municipal corporation at large, and not by the city marshal, it is claimed that a forfeit was posted and that the contest will be for a good sized side bet.

Washington, June 1.—Washington returned home today, after a long absence, and was shut out by Philadelphia through the efforts of the Philadelphia team.

R. M. Boardman and W. W. Conover, discharged city teamsters, again demanded their positions on the ground that they had not been discharged by the mayor, who appointed them. The communications were ordered returned to the writers.
