addressed the congregation. He said in substance: If there is one thing above all others for which I am grateful to my heavenly Father, it is the testimony of seeing to administer the priesthood of the gospel personally to others, who are the instruments of the giver of that heavenly gift.

It encompasses not only God's children in the spirit world, but they may yet fail to be accepted by the Father in heaven.

The limited idea of the world concerning the plan of salvation does not afford safety any more or less than a *nest* is of the *nest* of the plan of the plan of our Father.
