

A slight amendment, providing a penalty, will suffice to accomplish the desired end and should be passed. TAXATION OF MINES.

We are without an adequate and equitable system of taxation for mines and mining property, and in consequence in some counties of the state, where the mining interests are large, there are ancer ainty and pending conflict in the matter of assessment and collection axes. This greatly unsettles the pubic finances of those counties, and is a condition of affairs which avaits legisstand with you ative action for settlement. This ses-sion should not pass without placing on our statute books a much needed law providing a fair and certain method for the taxation of states of the west in which the mining industry is highly developed will furn-

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
