

## THE FAR NORTH.

There is no more small pox in Gothenburg.

S. E. Olofson, of Vestervik, Sweden, committed suicide in Copenhagen.

Rornsholm, brick works, near Eslof, were burned down the other day.

The crown princess will again leave Stockholm in the fall for a southern climate.

Ninety-six petitions from emigrants who wanted to emigrate were discussed at the last meeting of the cabinet.

The aldermen of Stockholm have granted 35,000 crowns to the insane asylum at Kungsholmen.

K. J. Gestalton, a teacher in a school at Bodenham, Stockholm, has disappeared mysteriously.

Princess Stephanie, of Austria, has left Sweden, after having declared her high pleasure with the visit.

Ang. Anderson, of Hammarstrand, the parish of Delsbo, committed suicide by hanging himself.

Allied Nordström, a prominent wholesale merchant, has been forced to make an assignment.

G. Danielsson and A. Johnson, of Linköping, were drowned in the Stang river at Linköping. Both men have families.

A shot-breaker, named Holmlund, of Helsingør, emigrated to America last year, leaving many angry creditors. A couple of weeks ago he sent home money to pay every one of them.

The philosophical faculty of the University of Upsala was decided to confer the degree of doctor of philosophy upon Prof. O. Olson, the president of Augustana College, and Rev. C. A. Friesen, the president of Trinity College.

Mrs. Ellen Hartman, the famous actress, who was born many years ago in the Count Reinhold von Rosen's family, has returned to Stockholm and will probably in the fall reappear on the stage of the Royal Dramatic theater. Mrs. Hartman is at present staying at a summer resort near Stockholm. The reporter who interviewed her declared that she is just as young and beautiful as ever.

In a long distance bicycle race around Lake Mälaren, John Larsson covered six English miles in twenty-one hours, four minutes, thus winning the prize, consisting of a costly drinking-hat with appropriate inscriptions. At the next bicycle race at Malmö, Mr. Larsson of Christiansburg won the first prize in the one-mile race, and the second prize in the half-mile race.

**ROMANIA.**

It is stated that English services will be held in the church of Utsik, Hardanger, during the months of July and August.

It is suggested that the government ought to secure land for the Vardueren sufferers instead of furnishing aid in the shape of cash, as those who receive aid will go to America and thus lose aid.

In an editorial on the political situation the Verden's Gang says: "Such political stability as we now witness throughout the country is unprecedented before. **GERMANY.**

Two fishing attacks were lost off the coast of Iceland. Several members of the crews, consisting of twenty-nine men, leave families in destitute circumstances.

Meanwhile the rats and mice have increased in number at an alarming rate, and a few days ago the inhabitants of the island across the ice last winter, in numbers reported alone in order that they may repopulate the island with their kind, and again take up the battle with the rodent rodents.
