"PEACE! BE STILL!"
 Subject of Interesting Lecture by Dr. James E. Talmage.

A most interesting session of the University Sunday school was held yesterday. The attendance far exceeded that of any other day, and everyone seemed intensely interested in the discussion, by Dr. Talmage, of the beautiful and inspiring theme, "Peace, Be Still."

The song, "Peace, Be Still!" particularly suited to the subject of the lecture, was effectively sung by a quartet composed of Misses Margaret Summerville, Esther Cornell and Messrs. George F. Vining and Noel Pease.

In making answer to several questions and enquiries submitted in writing, Dr. Talmage laid stress on the independent writings of the evangelists, and pointed out that the uncertainty as to sequence of events disproved confusion amongst the separate writers of the four Gospels. The authorship of the author in each case was plainly that of setting forth the great deeds and the words full of import done and spoken by the Master, and no attempt appears in the nature of writing up a summary or journal. Let us bring in light on this subject by the writer of "Incidents in the Life of Jesus," another, hide the great truth declared by both.

Introducing the special topic of the day the lecturer reminded his hearers that we have here to deal with incidents occurring in the course of the second mission of Jesus in America. The journey Jesus was accompanied by the Twelve, and by a company of devout disciples, amongst whom were certain women who had been healed by the power of the Christ. Here we find first mention of Mary Magdalene. Multitudes gathered about this devoted band, obstructing the way and retarding progress.
